The regular monthly meeting of the Town Council was held Monday evening, the Mayor and all the Councillors, with the exception of Coun. Kirk present. After the usual routine work, it was decided on motion of Coun. Morris, seconded by Coun. Brace that all wharfage accounts be collected at least once a month. The resignation of Edward Fraser as engineer of

the fire engine Beaver was accepted, and Thos. Hickey was appointed to succeed him on motion of Coun. Morris, seconded by Coun. Goss. J. E. Wyatt was retained as prosecuting Attorney under the C. T. A. at a fee of ten dollars for each case, gained or confessed. The request of Albert Gaudet for an increase of 25 cts per day to his salary for the months of Aug., Sept. and October was granted. A letter from the Electric Light Co. was read intimating that owing to the increase in the cost of coal the contract for street lighting could not be renewed at the present rates and asking for a conference with the Council on the matter. Councillors Morris and Brace were appointed to confer with the Company, Coun. Goss asked if all the C.T.A. fines had been collected. The clerk stated that there are three out-standing fines. One of these was for a conviction obtained by the former prosecutor and it was necessary to get instruction from the Council in order to collect. Coun. Goss moved that this fine be collected at once, seconded by Coun. Brace and carried. Coun. James A. McNill was appointed to look after the painting of the fire engines. It was decided on motion to purchase 20 cars of stone, and 30,000 feet of plank for the streets. Joseph LeClair was engaged to build a brick tank at the west end for \$165. The Clerk and Wharfinger were appointed a committee to regulate the wharf tariff. After a lengthy discussion of street matters the Council adjourned.

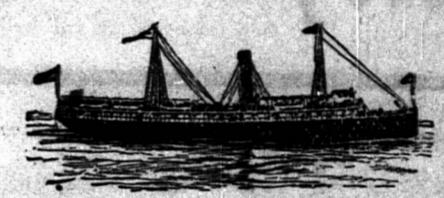
