REV. DR. McLEAN delivered his interesting lecture Out West on a Broncho, in First Methodist Church last evening to a fair audience. His oratorical power and pleasing manner engaged the attention of all. Dr. McLean, who twenty years ago labored among the Indians, spoke chiefly of their customs and manners, giving much interesting Indian lore. Speaking of the vast resources of the Northwest, he urged those leaving the Island, to go West instead of to the United States.

AN assault which threatened to assume a most serious aspect occurred at Peake's station last Friday evening on the arrival of the train from Charlottetown. On board was a young man belonging to the locality to whom another family held a grudge. When the man alighted from the train several set upon him and the result was a hand to hand fight which was most brutal to say the least. In the melee others joined and among them was the father of one of the assailants who produced a revolver and threatened to shoot. The fight was stopped after some time and the one who was attacked was put on board the train and taken down the line to St. Theresa's while some of his friends assisted in restoring him as much as possible to his usual appearance. It is likely that a law suit will result from the trouble.

MANY friends will hear with great regret of the death from pleurisy of Dennis E. Clarke, which sad event took place at his home, Orwell Corner, yesterday morning. Deceased was in his 65th year. He was born in Ireland and came to this province a number of years ago, settling at Orwell, where he carried on a large mercantile business for many years, and was also extensively engaged in agriculture. His wife who was Miss Craig of Halifax, four daughters and three sons, Frank in Calgary, William in Winnipeg, and John at home survive him. His daughter Fannie who is in Halifax was telegraphed for yesterday. The late Mr. Clarke was highly esteemed by all with whom he was acquainted.
