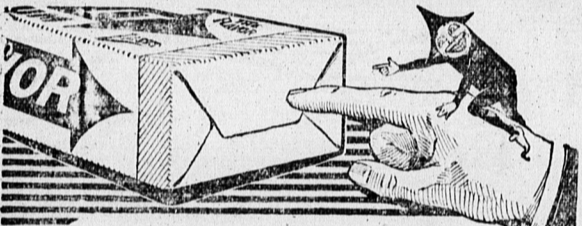

TRUCE GRANTED BY MINERS TO DECIDE ISSUE

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., July 29.—Refusal of anthracite operators to grant the demand of the United Mine Workers of America for installation of the check-off dues paying system throughout the industry resulted today in the sudden collapse of contract negotiations.

After a bitter contest of words in which each side charged the other with responsibility for the state of affairs and declared its opponent was making an unfair bid for public support of an unjust cause, the joint committee of eight adjourned sine die.

At the last moment a resolution was passed authorizing the secretary to reconvene the committee

if either side indicated it had anything worth while to concede. There was no indication, however, that miners or operators saw any weak spots in their own armour or that of their opponents which would be apt to justify a resumption of negotiations. Since the union already had publicly declared it would not submit to arbitration, the only possible peace agreement seen in the way of the threatened strike on September 1, was a government intervention.

The final break was preceded 24 hours by the miners ultimatum demanding to know the operators attitude toward complete recognition of the union, including the closed shop and check-off system before they would proceed with the discussion of their other demands for higher wages and improved working conditions. The operators have promptly refused to grant such "complete recognition," or conference warranted immediate adjustment of the miners finally agreed to a 24-hour truce, which ended this afternoon.

Says Banking Has Wide Field For Women

CLEVELAND, July 29.—There is a great field in banking for women according to Mrs. C. E. Hearin, of Clay, Ky., who attended the recent twenty-first annual convention of the American Institute of Banking here. Mrs. Hearin is vice president of the Farmers National Bank of Clay. "Women are better in matters of detail than men, although as a rule they are not so good executives," Mrs. Hearin said. Asked if she did not think women aren't a trifle too sympathetic Mrs. Hearin said: "The very thing we need is more sympathy. For instance a young man comes in for a loan, trying to get a start in life. I think we ought to be just as liberal with him as we can ten years from now he may be the biggest man in the community."

DROWNED TRYING TO SAVE GRANDFATHER

THE PAS, Man., July 29.—Bernard and Mollie Stitt, aged 12 and 10, children of Barney Stitt, Mayor of The Pas, and Ethel and Maudie Bennett, aged 11 and 12, were drowned on Tuesday while bathing at Pike Lake, seven miles from this town.

The children, with three others, had been taken to Pike Lake in a motor boat by the grandfather of the Stitts, a man of about eighty. While they were all bathing the old man got into difficulty and the children went to his rescue, and were caught in a strong current and swept away. Mr. Stitt reached shore after great exertion. Little Anthony Bennett was rescued by an Indian woman when he had been carried 300 feet. The others of the party to survive were on shore at the time.

The same day there was reported the death, apparently from suicide of Percy H. Taylor, a trader at Mile 125 on the Hudson Bay Railway and the accidental death of Frank Nicolls, a pioneer resident of The Pas. Mr. Nicolls seemed to have been cleaning his gun when it discharged into his body.

WASHINGTON, July 29.—Senator Simons, veteran democrat from North Carolina, former chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, said some time ago that the tariff would be a leading issue in the 1924 campaign and some recent developments tend to confirm his prediction.

It is evident that this view is taken by the democratic national committee, which is beginning its bombardment of the republicans preparatory to the grand struggle of next year. The democratic leaders are devoting much attention in their statements and literature to the tariff and its workings.

Encouragement to do this has been given the democrats by the result of the recent campaign in Minnesota. There, it was clearly demonstrated that the farmers had come to the conclusion the new tariff law was not helpful to them.

The democrats are also encouraged by reports which are coming to them from New England. These reports, which come from good authority, indicate the New England farmers are becoming more and more resentful of the fact they are selling their products at low prices and paying high prices for what they have to buy.

The discontent among the New England farmers, according to reports arriving here, is such that the progressive republicans are threatening to try to capture the senatorship in Vermont to succeed Senator Dillingham, who died recently.

Although there is little question the operations of the new tariff law are going to be much debated in Congress this winter and on the stump next year. The failure of the Harding administration to make any real use of the flexible tariff will be much criticised by the low tariff men and moderate tariff advocates. It looks much as if the country would see another tariff revision in 1925. If the Harding administration is re-elected, it is by no means improbable it will be forced by sentiment, especially in the agricultural states, to ask Congress to overhaul and moderate rates.

ENTRY OF GREECE AND HOLLAND INTO LITTLE ENTENTE

PARIS, July 29.—The entry of Holland and Greece into the Little Entente will be the most important event growing out of the Little Entente conference to be held at Smyrna, Roumania, next week, according to the Belgrade correspondent of the Matin. Special significance is attached to the conference he says in view of the existing situation in the Balkans and Central Europe.

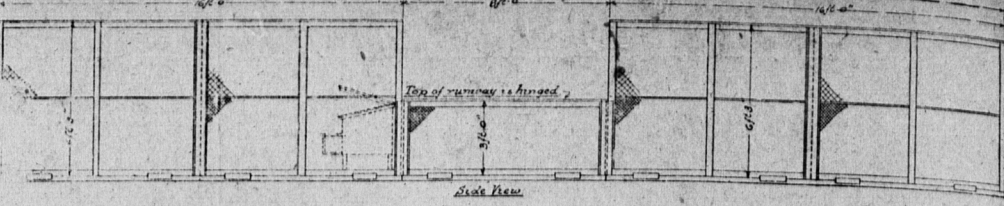

IN ANCIENT EGYPT BRIDES COST FOUR DOLLARS EACH

LONDON July 29.—Professor W. Flinders Petrie, the eminent Egyptologist who was recently knighted by King George, gives some interesting information regarding the private life of the ancient Egyptians. The earliest marriage contract known in Egypt he says dates from 590 B. C. The terms of the pact, as drawn up by the husband, were as follows: "Since God willeth that we should unite one with the other in rightous wedlock, after the manner of every free man and every wise woman, therefore I have given thee four dollars in gold as a bridal gift, that thou mayest come and enter my house as a free woman. And for my part I will not neglect thee more than as if were my own body. Neither shall I be able to put thee forth without cause, having legal ground. But should I wish to put thee forth, I will pay 17 dollars for the matter."
