Fossil Footprints Found In Canada

FINGERPRINT RECORDS OF GIANT BIRDS AND ANIMALS

MICHEL, B. C.—Foot-prints of giant birds or bird like animals which inhabited the valleys of eastern British Columbia many hundreds of years ago have been unearthed near here by recent coal mining operations.

The impression of this fossilized footprint has the appearance of a large chicken's foot with three toes. One of these toes is spread at a much larger angle from the centre toe than the other. The measurements of one of these strange footprints showed it to be fifteen inches across from outer to outer toe, and to have a length of about seventeen inches along the central toe.

Numerous footprints of this ancient form of life have been revealed. In one case alongside the larger prints there ran a trail of small footprints, preserving in literal tablets of stone the record of a mother bird being followed by her little ones.

These footprints were found in the Fernie shales about one foot above the coal seam. This coal measure is one

of the highest of the series found at Michel in the Kootenay strata.

Many delicate fern-like impressions have also been discovered in these shales, and they are so perfect that almost every frond is clearly shown. They tell a story of a time thousands of years ago, when the climate of the Crow's Nest Pass country, being very warm and moist, was conducive to a luxuriant tropical growth of vegetation. The whole area was evidently a large swamp in which ferns as large as trees flourished. It was the falling leaves and stalks of these enormous plants that composed the present coal measures for which the country is noted.

This luxuriant vegetation fostered animals of an equally fabulous size, such as could have grown only where there was a huge supply of fodder. These vegetarian animals, were, in turn, preyed upon by carnivorous monsters.

Anthropologists believe that the animal life of the period indicated by the footprints was mostly of a lizard type. The birds also had characteristics of lizard life and were very different from the bird species of today.

Several years ago there was found in the shales of Fernie, a gigantic fossil lizard twelve feet long, having a vast horned snout. It was found in strata underlying the coal measures, and was said to be a fish-eating lizard of an age before coal horizons were formed. Lying in the still waters of the swamp it became gradually infiltrated with lime or silicates out of the water until every particle of its body was replaced by these hard substances, thus preserving through the ages a perfect replica of the animal in its original form. Geologists believe that the lizard belonged to an age more than a million years older than the bird footprints. The fossil lizard is now in the Victoria Museum at Ottawa, catalogued as an ichthyosaurus.

Organic remains are rare in Prince Edward Island, and are principally belonging to the vegetable kingdom. At New London some years ago, part of the jaw of a reptilian was discovered, on digging a well on the farm of Mr. D. McLeod. It was identified as belonging to a species of dinosaur, with the portentous name of Bathynathus borealis, which has been described as a modern sized alligator scaled and crested, mounted erect on a pair of powerful posterior limbs which enables it to leap with the agility of a frog. Its jaws were short and powerful and armed with sabre-shaped teeth, four inches in length. Its whole structure evinced great strength and agility and it belonged to the most perfect family of reptiles that ever appeared on the earth. Its length was about ten feet and with a bound of sixteen or eighteen feet it leaped upon its prey. Not good company on a dark night on a lonely road!

For The Cook

PRUNE TAPIOCA
One-half cup tapioca, one-half teaspoon salt, one-quarter cup sugar, two cups boiling water, one-half lemon, one-half pound prunes. Cook tapioca in double boiler 20 minutes, adding sugar and salt. Add prunes which have previously been cooked and mashed to a pulp. Also lemon juice. Serve with plain or whipped cream.

Household Hints

Button Receptacles
Discarded shaving-soap boxes make handy little receptacles for buttons. They can be slipped easily into the sewing-machine drawer, a different box used for each kind of button. Watermelon
To preserve watermelon for winter take a ripe melon and give it a good coat of shellac. Bury it in the cellar (if a dirt floor), about two or three feet deep. Bran or dry sand will answer for burying. Panama Hats
To clean panama hats apply an ordinary spot remover. Cover thickly with fuller's earth and lay the hat away for several days. then brush thoroughly.
