For the first time several ladies joined with the class and it is hoped many more men and women will equal themselves of the privilege.

In the evening Rev. Dr. J. H. Arnpup of Toronto, gave an address in the interest of the Missionary and Maintenance Fund. There was a large congregation who followed Dr. Arnpup with close interest as he told in brief of the missionary work carried on by the United Church of Canada, with special reference to China and conditions in that nation, giving testimony from his

own observation and experience there of the enduring character of the work carried on by the Missionaries and native Christians in the face of terrific persecution.

The service of praise comprised an Anthem both morning and evening, also organ music by Professor Kendall, before the evening worship. During the past week the following tribute was received from a radio listener in Nova Scotia. HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 2.—The passenger air service operated experimentally between Halifax and Boston this summer is to be continued in the coming year. Mrs. William Mutch, Sec'y Ringwood Women's Institute. Dear Mrs. Mutch:

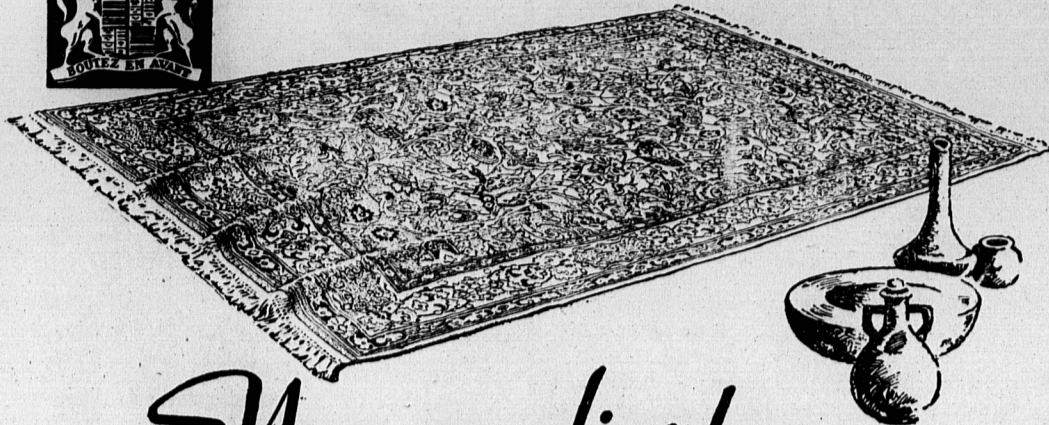
