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SEDUCTIVE MAGIC

You can do a lot with a little rouge. For a normal face the simplest way to make sure it is right is to curve the cheeks in a smile, apply the "centres" of your rouge to the centre of your smile, and work out to the edges of the smile lines! In every case, the rouge must be worked in right up to the eyes, otherwise some lights will show you as having a sickly palor under your eyes.

For a long face, put your centres fairly high up on the cheek-bones and work lower to the nose, and work it more to a point at the bottom than at the top. Always roughly dab your rouge on in the same spot—no chiselling.

Then with a clean piece of cotton-wool work with that amount, gradually getting it to the correct shading.

Your eyelashes should always be a shade or two darker than the brows. An eyebrow pencil can give become length or accentuated arch to the brows, but it is an obvious method, and careful plucking is usually more attractive.

WINDOW SASH CORDS NEED FREQUENT CHECK

When double-hung windows are in use, sash cords should be checked frequently. They should be inspected, too, when a house is being considered for purchase. A broken window cord can result in broken glass or crushed fingers. If the only result is jostled putty, the accident is annoying.

Changing a sash cord is not simple. The stop bead—the strip of moulding that keeps the sash in place—must be removed. If there are metal washers, these also must be taken out, so that the weight may be reached through the little door that is located inconspicuously in the pulley stile.

A flimsy or lifting pulley wheel will wear through a cord in a short time.

THE COOK'S CORNER
GINGER NUTS

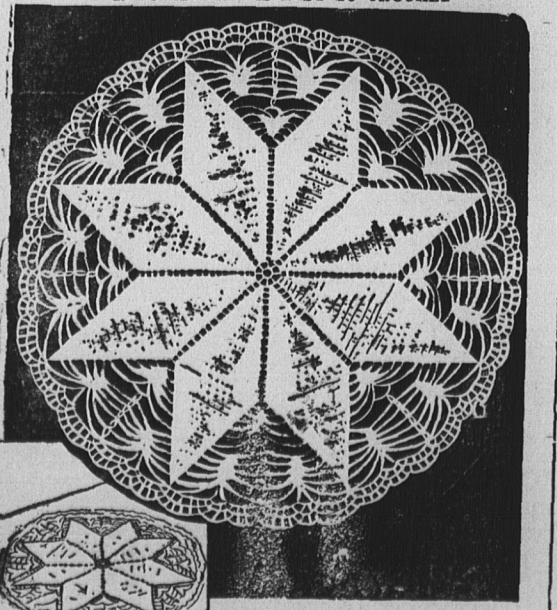
One cup corn syrup, 3-4 cup shortening, about 3 1/2 cups pastry flour, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 1/2 cups molasses, 1 1/2 cup shredded citron peel, 1/2 cup sugar. Heat syrup, melt shortening in it, then cool. Add dry ingredients, sifted together, then the peel. Roll out thin on floured board, cut in star and Christmas tree shapes, and bake in oven of 375 degrees until done. Be careful to watch these, as they burn easily.

FRUIT OATMEAL COOKIES

One cup sweetened condensed milk, 1/4 cup corn syrup, 1 cup fine rolled oats, 1-2 cup chopped peanuts, 1-2 cup small Australian raisins. In top of double boiler place the condensed milk, corn syrup and rolled oats. Bend thoroughly and cook over boiling water until mixture thickens, about ten minutes. Stir frequently while cooking. Add raisins. Drop by spoonfuls on to a buttered baking sheet, and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) about fifteen minutes. Remove from pan at once with spatula.

NOEL STARS

One cup butter, 1-2 cup icing sugar, few grams salt, 2 cups flour, 1-4 teaspoon rose water, 1-2 cup each of chopped green cherries, chopped red cherries, and shredded toasted almonds. Cream butter, and sugar gradually and beat well. Add flour, a little at a time, and beat well after each addition. Add salt, rose water, cherries and almonds. Place in ice box for a few hours, then pat out about 1/4 inch thickness, cut in star shapes and bake in slow oven until just a delicate brown.

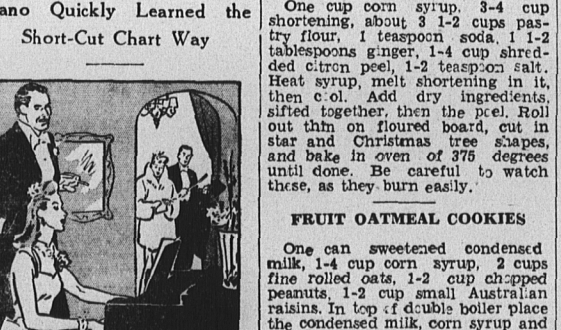
