A TREAT TONIGHT AT PRINCE EDWARD.—Tonight a treat is in store for all lovers of good healthy amusement who appreciate talent in children, as Mr. Rossley opens an engagement at the Prince Edward Theatre with his high class musical comedy company mostly composed of children. THE KAISER'S VILLA AS BRITISH HOSPITAL

ATHENS, March 9.—The German Emperor's villa, Archillean in Corfu, which is to serve as a hospital for Serbian wounded under the care of a staff of British doctors and nurses, was built by the Empress Elizabeth of Austria at a cost of \$15,000,000. The German Emperor acquired it from Emperor Francis Joseph for \$350,000. The Empress Elizabeth in the course of her almost ceaseless wanderings, found temporary peace in Corfu, which he called the "paradise of earth's islands," and the villa was erected to shelter her own supervision. It is superbly situated above the azure Ionian sea, amid jungles of ever-blooming roses, palms and native and tropical trees, and many of its 123 rooms in the oriental and Byzantine styles, the happiest being especially remarkable. As might be expected from one of the Empress's athletic tastes, there is a magnificent gymnasium, and the marble swimming pool and the stables are equipped in the most lavish way, or seven years the Empress spent a month each year in the villa, but the Emperor returned her death she decided not to return and had the furniture sent back to Vienna. Francis Joseph never visited the place. Queen Alexandra of England on one occasion visited the German Imperial family at the Achilleion. It was while she was staying in Greece with her brother of the late King George.

We are out of the trenches now for a few weeks rest and you may depend we are enjoying same very much. It will be well on in March before we go back. I have this very minute received a letter from home. I received 2 pairs socks from H. D. McLean, also several packages cigarettes. It was very kind of him I'm sure. I smoke quite a lot since I left Canada, but did not start until I joined. It is very good pastime in the trenches. Tell Harry McLean the parcel was quite in order, the socks are the best and smokes were fine. I'll not mind casting my vote for him next election. I suppose he will be the next candidate for Federal House. He sure had a big majority for a local election. What do you think about the destruction of the Parliament Building. It was the most modern building. We put one over on them lately. It was fine work and very daring. I'm not allowed to state particulars, but if I can locate an account of it which appeared in the London papers I'll forward same to you. Well Dad I must close, give my kindest regards to all and write often. I remain, Your loving son PIUS.
