105th Transferred To Highland Regiment

Word has been received from Ottawa by Captain J. Rowland Paton, adjutant of the 105th, that the unit has been transferred to a Highland Regiment. This news will doubtless be received with a great deal of interest by Prince Edward Islanders who remember with pleasure the splendid work done by officers and men of this regiment during the Great War. In consideration of the large proportion of our population who are of Scotch extraction this action appears most pleasing and satisfactory. It is understood that the kilt of the Black Watch, one of the most famous of the British line regiments has been adopted for the 105th. The regiment will be equipped with khaki doublets, the Black Watch kilt, hose-tops, gaiters, sporrans and Glengarry caps. However, it was found impossible that this equipment should be ready for the training course this summer but will probably be issued in the fall.

The unit will go under canvas this year on June 28th for nine days. Lt. Col. Allan McLeod has been granted an extension of command for one year. The strength has been increased by 40 per cent, the quota now being 125 officers and men.
