The prices quoted by the wholesalers are:—Potatoes 40c; Fresh hay \$18; white oats, 60 to 71c; black oats 61 to 63; straw, \$5.50 to \$6.50.

Following upon the Tennis tournament with Summerside, played last Friday the Charlottetown park club men Monday had a match with players from the Abegweit. Four teams from each club played. Each pair played each of the opposing four teams eleven games. Each pair thus played forty-four games, and the total number of games played was 177.
