## THE "MAPLE LEAF" TOBACCO FUND FOR CANADIAN PRISONERS OF WAR.

The seventh issue of the "Maple Leaf" Magazine which is published on behalf of the Canadian Prisoners of War Tobacco Fund, has just come to hand. This bright little "regimental" publication provides some good reading of general interest, and in particular a stirring story "Straight from the Trenches" written by an officer in realistic vein.

It also contains several portraits of "Higher Authorities" in the Overseas Military Forces of Canada, and a good deal of interesting personal information respecting promotions, honours and awards to Officers, and other ranks among our gallant kinmen.

Other items in the number include a message from the Dominion Premier Sir Robert L. Borden, whose portrait is also given; an article—"To Arms Overnight"—by the Hon. Robert Rogers, Minister of public works, Canada; and another, entitled "After Baghdad—Berlin (?)", by the Editor Oliver A. Minns, P. I. S. A. C., in which he tells of the attractive features of "Berlin, and points out that it is now the chief objective of the Allies. This is illustrated by a splendid view of the city in which may be seen the Kaiser's Palace, the Cathedral, and the famous "Under den Linden," showing that Berliners have much to be proud of, and therefore anxious to preserve.
