Research Council Lab For Dalhousie

HALIFAX, June 1.—(CP)—The regional research laboratory which the National Research Council has decided to establish on Dalhousie University's campus here will be the first such laboratory in eastern Canada, University authorities said in a statement tonight.

The Council's announcement was made in Ottawa Saturday and Dalhousie authorities said the University is pleased to make the site for the laboratory available. The only precedent for the Council's decision to build at Dalhousie was a similar building at the University of Saskatchewan, serving the Prairie Provinces.

Size and cost of the new building have not yet been indicated. The Dalhousie statement said, but plans will go forward immediately and it is hoped that construction will begin next year.

The building will house a staff of scientists working in close harmony with Dalhousie, with the newly-formed Nova Scotia Research Foundation and with all projects designed to teach and promote science and scientific research in the Maritimes.

Boy Missed Death In Plane Crash

NEW YORK, June 1.—(AP)—A 15-year-old boy who missed death by seconds as he left his bicycle in the path of the United Air Lines DC-4 plane which crashed at La Guardia field last Thursday night, appeared at the scene today to claim his battered bike and to take pictures of the wreckage.

The bicycle was found in the wreckage of the crash which took 42 lives. The boy, Richard Schultz, told police he had been out snake hunting and had left his bicycle to look for a container in which to put a 15-inch garter snake he had caught, when the plane hurtled over a service road and crashed into the ditch where it burst in flames.

Richard said he was only about 40 feet away from where the plane cracked up and declared it was going "pretty fast and was not in the air" before the accident. He added that he heard no explosion.

Rev. W. A. Young Inducted At Tyne Valley

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in the Church at Tyne Valley on May 27th, for the induction of the minister-elect, the Rev. Willis Arnold Young, B.A., who had served the combined charge of Tyne Valley, Freeland, Lot 14 Richmond Bay, and Victoria West, as ordained missionary for a year, and who had received a unanimous call to be the minister of the parish.

The service was conducted by the Rev. Charles Carnegie, in the absence of the moderator of the Presbytery, Rev. T.A. Duke, B.A. The sermon was delivered by the Rev. Donald A. Campbell, B.A., the charge to the Minister was given by the Rev. Charles Carnegie, who had been interim moderator of the charge since the removal of the Rev. Hugh M. Creaser, B.A., in July, 1944, to Durham, N.S.; and the charge to the congregation was given by the Rev. George B. Cunningham, B.A., of Alberton. The Rev. Jas. A. MacGowan, D.A., acted as clerk in the absence of the Rev. T.H.B. Somers. Mr. Gordon MacArthur, elder, was also present.

Before the service of induction was held the sacrament of holy baptism was administered to Ruth Eileen, the infant daughter of the Minister-elect and Mrs. Young, by the uncle of the child, the Rev. F. Norman Young, B.A., of Marshfield.

The Rev. Willis Young is a native of London, Ontario, a graduate in arts of the University of Western Ontario and in theology of Knox College, Toronto.

Potato Steamer Sails From S' side

The Swedish ship Ekofors left Summerside harbour Saturday afternoon having completed loading a cargo of 128 carloads of potatoes for Britain. This amount completed the contract for potatoes but as the ship did not have a full cargo arrangements were made for her to pick up the balance of her capacity in pit props at Georgetown.

This is the third and last ship to load potatoes at Summerside this season. Altogether 65 cars or approximately 388,000 bushels of potatoes were shipped by sea from Summerside to Britain this year and upwards of \$10,000 was disbursed in wages to longshoremen. The loading of the three ships was without incident with the exception that the second ship was held up for a part of a day when the longshoremen went on strike over a dispute in regard to wages. The prevailing rate of pay at the end of the season was 15 cents an hour for both day and night shifts.—S.

Ottawa Silent On Newfoundland Union

OTTAWA, June 1.—(CP)—Canadian Government officials are preserving a discreet silence on the question of Newfoundland's possible entry into union with the Dominion, pending the arrival here June 25 of a Newfoundland delegation.

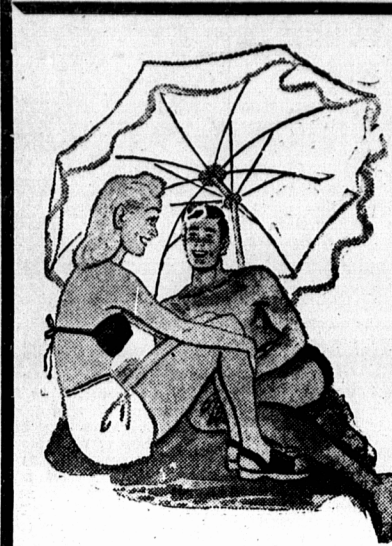
Officials declined to comment on a dispatch from Montreal Friday quoting Maj. Peter J. Cashin, member of the Newfoundland national convention, as saying only a "small minority" of Newfoundlanders were seeking a merger with Canada.

The Canadian government's policy is understood to be one of willingness to accept Newfoundland if the colony decides to join, and this attitude is expected to govern the exploratory talks with the delegation next month. However, officials feel there should be no appearance of "pressure" on the part of the Dominion towards a union, and they are maintaining a strict "no-comment" policy as not to prejudice the discussions.

MONTREAL, June 1.—(CP)—The Junior Chamber of Commerce of Canada at final sessions of its 12th annual national convention here Saturday adopted resolutions favoring provincial government lotteries for charitable and educational purposes and extension to 25 years of the age limit for child dependents for income tax purposes.

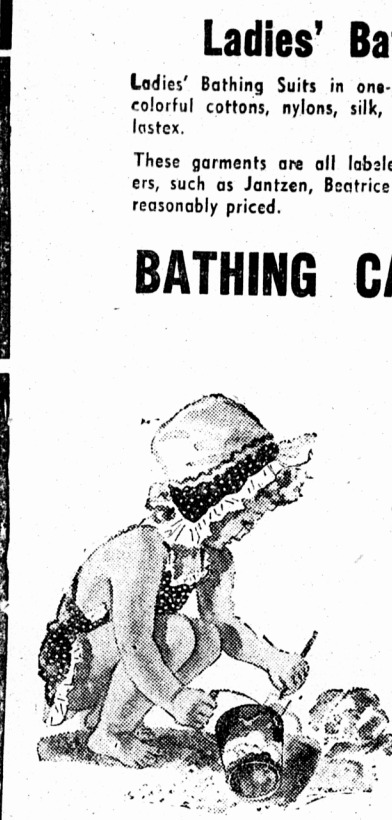

See Atomic War Decided In 60 Days

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, June 1.—A presidential commission depicted tonight the possibilities of an atomic age war so swift and so ferociously destructive that events of the first 60 days or less would determine whether the United States won or lost.

The President's advisory commission on universal training, in setting forth arguments for the training of citizens to repel such attacks and deal with chaos in "an atom-shattered metropolis," marshalled the testimony of the country's leading military authorities, including the army chief of staff, Gen. Eisenhower.

When should an attack be expected? For a period estimated by responsible scientists at not less than four years and not more than 10 years, we can expect immunity from such an attack because we alone possess the atomic bomb. After that the signal for a start of a war against us will, it is to be expected, be a large-scale onslaught with atomic explosives against our principal centres of population and production.
