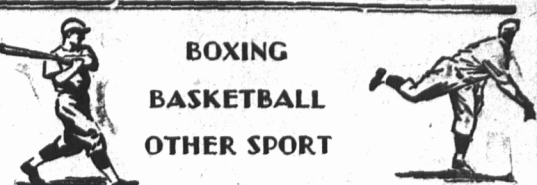

## Derringer Pitches Reds To 11-3 Win Over Cubs; Browns Upset Tribe 4-2

NEW YORK, April 27—Paul Derringer chalked up his second win of the season today as Cincinnati Reds romped over Chicago Cubs with an eight-run rally in the eighth inning for an 11-3 National League victory.

Ival Goodman led the Cincinnati attack, which snapped the Cubs' winning streak at four straight. Goodman hit his second home run of the year to start the eight-inning spree and tripled with the bases loaded later in the same inning.

At Philadelphia, Al Simmons' eighth inning homer and Tom Early's relief pitching gave Boston a 5-4 victory over Cleveland Indians today in the opener of a two-game American League series. Both clubs got only seven hits, but the Browns were punched off by the veteran Dutch Leonard. Dutch held the Athletics to nine hits as Washington blasted George Caster and Chubby Dean for 13 hits.

## Rookies Must Retain Pace To Hold Jobs

By EARL HILLIGAN Associated Press Sports Writer CHICAGO, April 27—Whatever the sport, the pressure usually falls heaviest on the pace-setters—and several rookies now face the problem of maintaining the high-speed standards they've set in their first few weeks in big-time baseball.

One of them is Barney McCoskey, a young Detroit outfielder who, through Wednesday's games, led the American League with a .515 batting average. One of the first native Detroiters in the Tiger team in years, he's been getting plenty of hits from the lead-off spot.

John Bernardino, St. Louis rookie, is playing a fine second base for the Browns. His performance makes manager Fred Haney bench either Red Kress or Don Reffner. Bernardino must hold to the pace or lose his job. Frank Croucher is battling gamely to do the regular shortstop chores for Detroit; Jim Taylor is third basing for Boston, and the infield combination of Cleveland's two "Jimmies"—Webb and Shilling, has taken the play from the veterans Lyn Lary and Odell (Bad News) Hale. Ed Miller of Boston has put Hal Wastler on the bench.

## Youth Training Bill Is Debated

OTTAWA, April 27—(CP)—Efforts of the federal government to provide training for young people in conjunction with the Provincial Government's youth training bill, were debated in the House of Commons tonight.

Labor Minister Rogers sought second reading for the bill to extend the youth training scheme for three years with an annual appropriation of \$1,500,000. From the opposition side the general tenor of the criticism was that the program was inadequate and from the Government side the argument, put forward was that the work was constructive, had accomplished much and would accomplish more.

## The SNAPSHOT GUILD

TRICK PICTURES

Simple "mask box" makes it easy to take pictures with trick frames. Above, "keyhole" picture; Right, box showing placement of camera and cut-out mask.

Upper right, various cut-outs: keyhole, gothic window, field glasses, fairway window, giant cactus silhouette, porthole and rocky cave mouth.

SNAPSHOTS with trick "frames" are easy to take, and fun to show. You can get pictures apparently made through keyholes or field glasses—and many other novel effects.

Obtain an ordinary cardboard box. It should be about twelve inches one way, and eight inches or more the other two dimensions. Exact size doesn't matter. Cut a hole in the middle of one end, a bit larger than your camera lens. Cut a large opening in the opposite end, and over this place a large "keyhole" cut out of cardboard (see drawing above). It is a good idea to paint the inside of the box black, to guard against stray reflections.

Now, place the box on a firm support, such as a table. Sight through
