By a mail vote, six clubs, including the Amherst Ramblers, St. Patrick's A. A. R. C. R. A. A. A., Resolute A. A. and Victoria A. A. (Charlottetown) have been admitted to membership in the M.P.A.A. The Crossburn, Annapolis Club, has also applied for membership.

A movement is on foot to furnish the 82 Battalion of this Province with a set of colors. With this object in view a fund has already been started and the colors will shortly be received. The suggestion came from Col. Vidal when he last inspected the regiment and has been taken up by the officers and men and Daughters of the Empire. The dance at the Armouries on Tuesday evening is also in aid of the project.

The following resolution was moved during the Legislature, Mr. Kennedy, seconded by Mr. Matheson: Resolved Whereas it was provided by the Railway Act of 1871 that a line of railway be constructed to connect Alberton with Georgetown, touching at Charlottetown and Summerside and that so as this line should be extended to Souris and Tignish and the revenue of the colony was pledged to the construction of the said road and its extensions, and Whereas the Act provides that after the said line and its extensions should have been completed, the railway should be extended to such other places as should be designated by an Act or by Resolution of the Legislature; and Whereas by Resolution of this Legislature passed in 1895 the claims of the southern part of King's and Queen's Counties to railway extensions were set forth; and Whereas by Act of the Federal Parliament passed in the year 1899 railway accommodation was provided for these places; and Whereas a large portion of Queen's County is still without railway facilities and is in urgent need of same. Therefore Resolved that in the opinion of this House a railway should be constructed from Emerald Junction to New London, also by a branch line tapping some point on the main line of the P.E. Island railway to Crapaud and Victoria. Capt Read moved, seconded by Mr. McWilliams the following amendment: That all the words after "portion" in the first line of the sixth paragraph be erased and the following substituted in lieu thereof: "Of Prince County and Queen's County is without railway facilities and are in urgent need of same." Therefore Be It Resolved: That a loop line railway be constructed on the north side of Queen's County beginning at a point at or near Rustico, Cavendish, New London, Clifton, French River, and meeting with the main line at Kensington; also a loop line on south side of main line beginning at Bonshaw, Crapaud, Victoria, Tryon and connecting with branch line at Albany; also a branch line from O'Leary to the west shore of Prince County in Lots seven and eight; also a branch line from Souris to Elmira. The resolution as amended, carried unanimously, being supported in speeches by Captain Read, Messrs McWilliams, Richards, McMillan, Kitcham, Hon. Messrs. McIntosh, Smith, Reid and Mr. Fraser.
