EASTERN NOTES.—The farmer is anxious for a fair share of rain after his experience of three dry summers in succession, but last year the overplus of that necessary factor in maturing his crop, ruined the crops in this part of the Island, and at the present time it looks like a repetition of last year. While May was a cold dry month, and the hay kept short and stunted, from which it has not and won't recover; June and July, so far have been remarkable for the heavy rain falls—every second day; scarcely has the ground dried from one wetting when it must take another, and though the crops, with the exception of hay look well so far, a continuation of the wet will very seriously effect the wheat and potatoes, and this is the more to be regretted as hundreds of bushels of imported wheat was sown here this spring; the native grown not being suitable for seed.—A few mackerel have been hooked off Campbell Cove on the north side and likewise on the south side, off the West River, and fishermen consider the prospects rather better than for some years. The waters surrounding East Point were once the summer resort of immense bodies of this beautiful and valuable fish, but the cupidity of man, not satisfied with the usual methods of getting rich, invented the purse seine, hundreds of barrels were taken at one set, scooped in on the deck, the small ones shovelled overboard to pollute the water, till the great body was caught and destroyed, the business became unprofitable, the handsome mackerel fleets of New England and Nova Scotia, have dwindled down to a few vessels, and hundreds of mills of netted twine lies rotting in warehouses, while our fishermen have to seek new channels of employment, and pay more attention to other more laborious and less remunerative branches of the fisheries.—Fred Beers and Mrs. Beers, of your city, paid a flying visit East the first of the week.—H. C. McMillian, Government engineer, was also visiting South Lake and North Lake bridges. A new structure has been built at the latter place, while the former one was considerably damaged by ice last winter. A difficulty that will confront every government of the future whether Liberal or Conservative is the problem of our bridges. The life of our present timber is a short one which wants frequent renewal; our bridges are large and many, our revenue a limited one which won't admit of many steel structures, and while the cry from part of the country for "new bridges" and "unsafe bridges," "give us plenty of money, but don't lay on taxes," every sensible man must know that no government can make money. They can only distribute what they collected from a great many different sources.
