VICE-REGAL VISIT TO CHARLOTTETOWN

The Governor General and Countess Minto Receive a Hearty Welcome

THE CAPITAL GAY WITH FLAGS AND BUNTING

The Landing at Pownal Wharf—Salute From Fort Edward—Address of City Council and Reply—Proceedings at Provincial Building—The Scottish Games Witnessed—Highland Brigade Inspected—Lady Minto Names a Baby—Reception at Government House—At the Tennis Court—Sail on the River—The Departure.

THE GATHERING OF THE PEOPLE. Saturday morning's trains from east and west brought in crowds of passengers and on all the roads leading to the city vehicles filled with old and young came thronging city wards, all eager to see His Excellency and Lady Minto and witness the reception to be accorded to them.

THE CITY IN FESTAL ARRAY. Citizens were expectant and determined not to miss the show. Charlottetown had hung out her banners on the outer wall, not in defiance of a coming foe, but in loyal and loving welcome to the official head of the Dominion.

THE ARRIVAL WAS DELAYED. The Viceroyal party had been first expected to arrive at 11 o'clock a. m. Later advice noted in yesterday's GUARDIAN had told of delay which would postpone the landing till noon.

MEANWHILE A LARGE CROWD HAD GATHERED on Pownal Wharf, on foot and in carriages while others floated on the placid waters in boats. A portion of the wharf where the landing was to take place had been carpeted and here was gathered a notable company, including His Honor the Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. McIntyre, Bishop Courtney, Judges of the Supreme and County Courts, Senator and Mrs. Ferguson, members of the Provincial Government, Mayor Warburton, with members of the City Council and civic officials.

THE ARRIVAL AND SALUTE. Shortly after 12 o'clock the steamer Minto had come to anchor, a boat put off from the wharf carrying with it the Lieutenant Governor, Bishop Courtney, Mayor Warburton, Major Stewart, and others who went on board the ship to welcome the distinguished visitors.

INSPECTION OF HIGHLAND BRIGADE. Upon invitation of President D. Stewart Lord Minto personally inspected the Highland Brigade and spoke kindly to the boys as he passed along the lines. When the inspection was nearly ended the band in front of Friv's Tommy Fullerton and engaged as to his age and commented upon his manly appearance.

MR. ROBERT JENKINS PRESIDENT. A photograph of Mr. Robert Jenkins' family (18) was handed to Their Excellencies and upon their request Mr. Jenkins was presented. It is needless to add that Mr. Jenkins was very obligingly attended to by Mr. Stewart.

THE GAMES AND RACES.

The games were intensely interesting, the different entries being well filled. Great credit is due the different committees especially the one of arrangements in connection with reception to the Governor General.
