Peace To Be Found In Soviet Communists
World Brotherhood Directing Campaign Increase Insurance
Declares W. W. Head In Balkan States

 GENEVA, Switzerland, Aug. 12.—The Father and Son Movement, developed in America where it has become a recognized institution, is spreading over the whole world. This was indicated today in a speech by Walter W. Head of Omaha, chairman of the National Father and Son Committee of the United States and also president of the American Bankers' Association, before the World's Committee of the Y. M. C. A. "More than 20 nations," he said, "observe Father and Son Week. In the United States alone upwards of 3,000,000 of fathers and sons joined in events during the past year."

The Father and Son Movement originated at a Y. M. C. A. banquet of fathers and sons at Providence, R. I., in 1907. Mr. Head stated. He said further: "Only as the fundamental principles of world brotherhood are recognized and accepted by the people of the world, can we ever hope to direct the destiny of the nations of the world during the next generation are now the young men who are in our homes today. What greater privilege has a man than to give of himself as a companion, teacher, advisor, and as a father to his son, who tomorrow steps into responsibilities the significance of which we cannot conceive."

"Every man, whether or not he bears the physical relation of father and son, should give serious consideration to his own life. The example will always prove to be an inspiration to the boy life of today in encouraging the spirit of world brotherhood."

"In the United States we believe it most appropriate to observe National Father and Son Week at that period of the year when Armistice Day comes. This has proven to be an opportune time not only to pay honor and respect to the millions of fathers and sons who gave their lives for the ideal of world brotherhood, but a time for the fathers and sons who survive to reconsecrate themselves to life for that same great objective, world brotherhood."

The World's Committee of the Y. M. C. A., is planning to cooperate in making the Father and Son Movement universal. Details are to be worked out by the Boys' Work Division staff, of which E. M. Robinson, former senior secretary of the Y. M. C. A. Boys' Work in America, is now secretary.

Is Tobacco Harmful?
 OTTAWA, Aug. 12.—Not long ago it was stated in the Press that a doctor in a recent conference upheld that smoking tobacco does not hurt the heart. There were cheers in the Press and elsewhere. Authorities have discovered 20 poisons in cigarette smoke. Some of these are from 5 to 50 times more poisonous than alcohol. The Lancet, of London, England, has said lately that tobacco is a poison quite apart from nicotine and has explained other deadly constituents. Dr. Kross, of the Washington Sanatorium, speaks about the large number of men who die suddenly while apparently strong. Then he tells of changes in vital organs that go on as a result of taking poisons into the blood, as through smoking. But, he says, it is hard to make men admit that smoking is bringing depravity all through.

COLOUR BLINDNESS MAY BE CORRECTED

TORONTO, August 12.—Colour blindness may be corrected by the wearing of special spectacles. In the opinion of H. E. Roaf, M. D., D. Sc., professor of physiology at London Hospital Medical School, who communicated a research of the British Association today, Dr. Roaf has found that in the case of many persons whose ability to distinguish colours is not perfect, that the eye receives sensations from the complete range of the spectrum of colours, just as the normal individual does, and that the intensity of the stimulation is about the same as if there were no lack of differentiation. The usual tests for colour blindness consist in asking the subject to match various colours, and the completeness of his facilities in this connection is judged by the accuracy with which he makes the match. Those afflicted with so-called "hyochromatic vision" find it impossible to distinguish certain shades which are obviously different to the normal eye. Prof. Roaf has discovered, however, that if the patient re-examines the matches through a coloured screen, he realizes his mistake at once in many cases, and sets aside the combinations which do not agree. This is the principle of the proposed method of treatment.

\$37,720,776 FOR WHEAT

The total distributed initial interim payments are \$31,934,776, while the final payment now being sent out makes up the balance of \$5,786,000.

 ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Aug. 12.—The malamute dog, for many years the famed steed of the north country is destined to go. With the coming of railroads, dog teams were driven farther into the interior. And now the prevalence of reindeer herds and the growth of the market garden and town-lot garden have caused restrictions to be drawn around the malamute until he is coming to be classed a nuisance in the more settled parts of southern Alaska. The malamute and wild dogs of the north. All fowls and quadrupeds were his common prey. But when in more modern days, a malamute began pulling down reindeer and the livestock of farmers, he was treated as a pest and hunted down.
