MR. DOULL AND THE TIDES.

There is a colored preacher somewhere down south who preaches and teaches that the earth is flat and that the sun revolves around it daily. It is related also that once when a schoolboy was asked by his teacher whether the earth revolves about the sun or the sun about the earth, the said boy not being sure of his ground made answer, "sometimes one and some times t'other."

But while entitled to his opinion, Mr. Doull, when he enters upon a discussion of the tide, ought to deal with the tide. What is the tide? We quote the ordinary dictionary meaning:

"Tide—The periodic rise and fall, or flow and ebb of the oceans and the waters connected with them, due to the attraction of the sun and moon."

That definition expresses the belief of the scientific world and of the great mass of civilized mankind today. Mr. Doull dissents from that so far as the cause of the tides is concerned. But when he comes to giving reasons for the strange faith that is in him, he proceeds as follows:

"If then the sun and moon draw the earth (not the waters) toward them, &c. It so happens, however that the sun and moon do draw the waters toward them. And, moreover, the motion of the waters in the rise and fall of the tides is what is under consideration.

Whether the earth wobbles in its orbit as Mr. Doull wobbles in his argument need not greatly concern us. The visible tide rises and falls beside the fixed land. The fluent waters have a motion that the land has not, and this motion is called the tide.

This central fact Mr. Doull forgets or ignores. His premises are false and his conclusions necessarily absurd. We could rest well content for Mr. Doull to believe any moon-struck absurdity he pleases to accept, if he would only spare us his reasons, for reasons so-called, produced in the darkness and muddiness of an intellectual cbb and based on the shifting sands of false premises, can never be very luminous or convincing. But they may prove a little tiresome.

The Patriot says, "the statement is often heard and is no doubt fairly correct, that almost if not all representatives if brought to trial, might lose their seats." We cannot dispute the accuracy of the foregoing statement, but what an appalling commentary it is upon our political affairs! We have over 600 elected law-makers in Canada, federal and provincial, and it is admitted that but the merest fraction of these are lawfully elected. Surely it is high time that every Christian and moral agency in the country should put forth the utmost effort to secure pure elections.

Every honest elector should spurn an election bribe or election whiskey as he would a poison. Till this is done the very fountain of law and government is corrupted and our boasted free institutions are rotten at the core.

The nominations of Hon. J. H. Cumiskey and Mr. McCourt as candidates for the representation of the Third District of Queens took place yesterday. One week later the polling will take place. In this connection we wish to remark that one thing is of far more consequence than the success of either candidate, and that is that the election shall be purely and honestly conducted. The purchase of votes and the lavish distribution of whiskey, turning an election into an orgy, are a disgrace to our civilization, and doubly so in a Christian community such as ours where the sale or giving away of intoxicants is under ban. Public men and electors should reflect that in Russia men are placing their lives in peril to secure representative institutions. Here both our political parties by corrupt practices are wholly destroying the value of the ballot box. It is time for a change. Let us have a clean election in the Third District this time.

A WORK OF ART.

W. R. McKenzie, contractor and builder, New Glasgow, N. S., has just shipped to Belfast the stone for a monument to be erected in Belfast, P. E. I., in memory of the arrival of the Scottish immigrants who came to this Island by Lord Selkirk's ships—the Polly, the Dykes, and the Oughton—in August 1803, and made homes for themselves and their children in the woods of Belfast.

The foundation of the monument is to be a cairn of cobble work 6 ft. square and 3 ft. high. On this is laid the 1st base, 4 feet square and 1 foot 4 inches high, and next, the second base, 3 feet square and 1 foot 2 inches high. On top of this sits the "die, a solid piece of polished grey New Brunswick granite 4 feet high and 2 feet 4 inches square. This stone bears the inscriptions and representations of what was and is not and is and was not at Belfast.

On one corner of one face is a spruce tree and at the lower corner a sheaf of wheat. These represent the past and the present. On the opposite corner on the top is a sheaf of wheat and at the lower corner a sickle. Between these is the inscription:—

IN MEMORY OF THE ARRIVAL OF THE SCOTTISH IMMIGRANTS WHO CAME TO THIS ISLAND BY LORD SELKIRK'S SHIPS, THE POLLY, THE DYKES, AND THE OUGHTON, IN AUGUST, 1803, AND MADE HOMES FOR THEMSELVES AND THEIR CHILDREN IN THE WOODS OF BELFAST.

On the opposite side to these is a Scottish thistle and underneath this inscription:—Slan le tir nam beann's an fhrachaid, Tir ar sinne, tir ar gaoil; 'Tha 'n duigh gu teann fo dhairs', 'S air is gaoil 's gach ait. Bliadh ar n-earbs' an Rìgh na glòir, 'S gheith sinn fearann, saors', is ion, Anns na coilthibh farsuinn, mor' 'S theid gach bron re lar.

"Is leis an Tighearn an talamh, agus a an." Above the die comes the cap, 2 feet 10 inches square and 1 foot 2 inches high. This cap is very nicely finished with scroll work and hieroglyphics and the effect of the monument taken in all is very pleasing.

JUST HOW WE STAND.

The following is an extract from a speech delivered by E. Hal. Brown, Manager of the London & Lancashire Life Insurance Co. for Canada.
