NEW S. S. LINE.—A Halifax Exchange says: Joseph E. Bernier, of North Pole fame and who was in Halifax last winter in command of a steamer bound across, has succeeded in forming the St. Lawrence Shipping and Trading Company, limited and which now appears to be an assured success. The company has been formed with a capital of \$1,500,000, a large amount of which has been subscribed in Quebec and Montreal. A start has already been made by the company through the purchase of the steamer Guide which has on several occasions borne Captain Bernier and his hardy crew to the Arctic regions. She is now loading at Quebec and the company's other embraces ports on the Lower St. Lawrence, Prince Edward Island, the Magdalen Islands and Cape Breton later extending the service to Newfoundland. The company plans placing at least four vessels in the service. Captain Bouchard has been appointed master of the Guide and Captain Bernier will go with the steamer on her first trip to transport business in the interests of the company at the different ports of landing. Captain Bernier has been working on the formation of this company ever since he returned, after delivering the steamer he took to France from Halifax.

GERMAN PROFESSOR ESCAPED FROM BERLIN IN AIRPLANE

COPENHAGEN, June 24.—Four residents of Berlin attempted to escape from Germany Thursday in two airplanes. One succeeded in landing in Denmark but the other was brought down in the Baltic Sea by German guardships. The machine which landed in Denmark had two occupants, one is a professor in the University of Berlin. They say they fled from Berlin because of the conditions there. The two machines left Berlin early Thursday morning. The flight was noticed and guardships along the coast were warned. When the machines reached the Baltic the guardships opened up and brought down two airplanes. This machine which landed in Denmark is a large one of the albatross type.


