HOLLYWOOD, May 4—(AP)—Women were ordered away from picket lines patrolling Hollywood's movie studios today as the atmosphere grew more tense in the walkout of film craftsmen and laborers.

One minor disturbance occurred. Police denied reports of a more serious clash between workers and pickets.

At Paramount Studio, home "lot" for Mae West, Gary Cooper, Claudette Colbert and others, a picket aimed his small camera at a scenic artist as he was passing through the line. The worker knocked it out of his hands.

Angry groups gathered hurriedly about both men but police dispersed them.

CANADA HOUSE AT DISPOSAL OF CANADIANS

Many Dominion Visitors Will View Coronation Procession In And About Building.

LONDON, May 5.—Canada House enjoying a commanding view of Trafalgar Square will be laden with Canadians on Coronation Day. They will be inside, outside and even on top—nearly 700 of them. And the procession returning from the Abbey will pass right under their noses.

Stands erected along one side and the front of the building will seat about 550, who paid three guineas (\$15.75) for their seat and a buffet service. And through the windows and from rooftop vantage points will peer another 150, mostly Canada House employees who have earned their positions by dint of the extra labor which the Coronation has laid upon their shoulders.

7,000 CANADIAN VISITORS

There will be about 7,000 Canadians in London for the ceremonies. Besides the Canada House section about 5,500 have obtained government seats at half-cost prices along the procession route and many others have purchased their own seats through commercial vendors. Then there will be more than 200 Canadians seated in Westminster Abbey.

The day's routine for those going to Canada House will begin about 5 a. m. for though they don't have to be there until 7:00 the transportation problem (even if the bus strike is settled) will be something to reckon with.

Once arrived, they will be shown to their seats. This is to acquaint them with the arrangements and relieve the early congestion. Shortly after 7 a. m. the guests will be invited, in three sittings, to a sort of morning coffee fresher with rolls and butter which will be served in the reading room.

Back on the stands, they will pass the time listening to the broadcasting of the procession as it prepares to leave and leaves Buckingham Palace. Loudspeakers will be situated in and around the building.

PROCESSION TIMED

The procession is expected to reach Trafalgar Square, having travelled down the Mall from the Palace, at about 9:30. It will take about 45 minutes to pass around the corner and down Whitehall, past the Cenotaph and into Parliament Square across which is the Abbey.

Thereafter the Canada House guests will be served a buffet luncheon, again in the reading room. This will include all kinds of sandwiches, pastries, deserts and hot and cold drinks. Luncheon will be served in three sittings as was the breakfast.

The return procession, which is the larger one, is timed to reach Trafalgar Square about 2 p. m. It will have travelled from the Abbey past Parliament on the Thames embankment, along the embankment to Northumberland Avenue, up which it moves to Trafalgar

Their Majesties at Abbey Rehearsal

LONDON, May 4.—King George VI was crowned four times today in rehearsal of the Coronation a week from tomorrow.

After participating in the centuries old rite of accepting the baton of a Field Marshal, the Sovereign, accompanied by Queen Elizabeth, paid a surprise visit to Westminster Abbey.

Wearing a royal robe over ordinary street clothes, the King rehearsed for two hours with the Archbishop of Canterbury Queen Elizabeth also wore a royal robe of crimson velvet and ermine. But, as her own crowning was not rehearsed, she spent most of the time watching.

Their audience was a group of workmen in overalls and shirt sleeves. "The King was laughing and joking before and after but while the actual rehearsal was on he was solemn and serious," one of them said.
