Your short angora sock over the mesh stockings will look a little newer this year if the turn-down cuffs are divided and tied with tassels which loop over a colorful design knitted in at the instep. The pinpoint mesh in the stockings, seems to be slightly preferable to the round, more-open mesh, but this is probably only a temporary significance.

SPICED APPLE

- 2 cups flour. 1/2 teaspoon salt. 4 teaspoons baking powder. 1 tablespoon sugar. 3 to 5 tablespoons shortening. 2-3 cup milk.

Mix as you would biscuit dough—sift dry ingredients together, cut in shortening (making dough rich as you like) until mixture is like a coarse meal and add milk, mixing lightly. Turn out on floured paper or board and roll in oblong shape, 1/4 inch thick. Spread with 1 tablespoon softened butter.

Filling

- 2 cups tart diced apple. 1/2 cup seeded raisins. 1 tablespoon sugar. 1 teaspoon cinnamon. Mix three ingredients, spread them evenly over the sheet of buttered dough and roll it up like a jelly roll, moistening the edges and pressing them closed. Grease a baking dish, place the roll in it and pour over it the following mixture: 1 cup hot water. 1/2 cup molasses. 2 tablespoons butter. 1/2 teaspoon spice.

Baste the pudding frequently with this syrup during baking. Have oven moderately hot, 350 degrees F., and allow about 40 minutes. Serve with cream or hot vanilla sauce.

A correspondent asks: "What type of women do men prefer?" Oh, all sorts, for there are many men with many minds and each has a different mind about women. Some like them tall and some like them short. Some are strong for Amazons and others fall for pocket Venuses. Some like grabbers and others dummies. Highbrows and lowbrows each have their followers. But it is something fine and against that makes his love best the woman who is weak and helpless, who turns to him for protection and whom he must defend against the world.

She makes an appeal to him that the sturdy, self-reliant woman, who can stand on her own feet and fight her own battles, never does. And that is why the eternal feminine will always prevail and why women throw away their trump card when they cast their femininity into the discard.
