TRIPLETS SUCCUMB - None of the triplets born on Thursday morning in the Prince County Hospital to Mr. and Mrs. Walter Anderson of Abrams Village have survived. The babies, two girls and a boy, were a month premature and died about twelve hours after birth and the other two lived until early Saturday morning. They were very delicate, all under three pounds, but everything possible was done to save them. They had been kept under continuous oxygen and under the care of a private nurse but to no avail. Dr. L. S. Howlett, Wellington was the attending physician. The mother's condition as reported last night is good. As far as is known this is the first set of triplets ever born in the County Hospital. Mr. and Mrs. Anderson have three other children.-S.

Bishop Boyle Guest Speaker At Summerside

His Excellency, Most Rev. James Boyle, Bishop of Charlottetown, celebrated a special Mass yesterday morning for the members of the Holy Name Society of St. Paul's Parish, Summerside, who attended and received holy communion in a lesson that is not taught in the classroom. The greatest thrill of all for a Catholic is to meet the Holy Father," he said, "who speaks eight languages with facility." At this point in his address Bishop Boyle referred to the fact that the Holy Name Society had recently sent a letter to the local member of parliament, Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, and the Prime Minister asking that diplomatic relations be established with the Vatican. He said that while there he found it a disadvantage to have to look up the British ambassador, a very nice man, but he thought representative there. If other churches had a centralized body they would have a right to representation too, he said. The Bishop pointed out that the Papacy is not only the head of

the Church but it is also a state; practically all the countries of the world are represented there except Russia and her satellite countries and Canada, he said, so Canada is not in very good company. "In the Holy Name Society you are in the front line of Christ's army and we are facing a tremendous challenge to religion," the Bishop declared. "The conflict today is between God and the devil." He said that "we ought to thank God for having such a great Pope. It is only in times of great crisis that God raises up such a great man." Referring to the Catholic clergy that are being imprisoned and exiled behind the Iron curtain he said, "These men are our brothers." He stressed that we should not take the attitude that it can't happen here, as a small group put forward Communism in Russia because they were organized while the great masses of the people slept. He exhorted the men to do three things, to set a good example to others in public and private life to keep well informed by reading Catholic newspapers and magazines as well as the secular press and to participate in the running of the community by voting on all occasions and expressing their opinion on public questions. Concluding he hoped that they would continue their good work but it is not enough to go to Mass on Sunday and to the Sacraments twice or three times a year, we must try to bring the light of the gospel to others by word and example. In his opening remarks president William Fridgen, complimented the members on their fine attendance and explained the main purpose of the society as, to encourage love, honor and respect for the holy name of Jesus.
