## To Exhibit First of Two New World Pianos

JACKSON, Miss., Oct. 18.—Though its strings have long since become corroded and from its keyboard resounds horrible discords, a little piano, said to be one of the first two to reach the New World, will be a feature exhibit at the Mississippi State Fair.

The instrument is the property of City Commissioner R. M. Taylor who secured it from Miss Rosa Fisher, octogenarian of this city, in whose family it has been for generations. The mate to the piano is said by Miss Fisher to be in Mount Vernon, home of George Washington. Visitors to Mount Vernon describe the pianos as identical.

It is of French make, about 15 inches thick, 28 inches wide and about 60 inches long. There are seventy-three keys, connected in a vastly different manner from the pianos of today.

MONTREAL.—Receipts of local ungraded eggs are falling off. Dealers are paying for ungraded eggs delivered extras 44 to 50; firsts 38 to 41; seconds 28 to 35. Held stock still arriving, wholesale extras in cart 55; extras loose 50 to 54; firsts 45 to 46; seconds 34 to 35. Storage extras 42 to 43; firsts 39 to 40; seconds 34 to 35. Retail fresh extras 56 to 60; firsts 45 to 46; seconds 38 to 40.

WINNIPEG.—Market quiet. Consumptive demand good with wholesaler unable to fill orders for fresh extras and firsts seconds are selling strongly. Storage movement is slow and "break" with fresh receipts showing a further decline. Dealers are quoting country shippers extras 50, seconds 43. ## Development of Dramatic Talent in McGill University

A new Arts Building with the familiar face of the old, but with an interior on a scale to house for years to come the Arts Faculty which had far outgrown the dimensions of the old Arts Building erected 80 years ago, opened its doors this week to the throngs of returning undergraduates and these graduates of Old McGill here from far and near for the reunion being held on the 15th anniversary of their Alma Mater.

The central and outstanding feature of the new building, admittedly, is the Moyse Hall, or Moyse Theatre, as it is alternately called. Termed by architects and construction men like the last word in theatre and assembly hall construction, it has been erected by Lord Atholstan as a memorial to the late Dr. Charles E. Moyse, former Dean of the Faculty of Arts and for over 42 years a member of the University staff. With a seating capacity of 500 and two small ball rooms, it is a most desirable party place. The Moyse Hall is equipped with a modern stage and all appurtenances of the latest type known to theatredom, and a projection room for the showing of moving pictures.

To Develop Dramatic Talent in the new course in "The Technique of the Drama" which is being instituted at McGill in the English Department, under Dr. Cyrus Macmillan, professor and chairman of the Department of English, the Moyse Hall will amply demonstrate its place in university life.

This new course, possible in the widest degree by the erection of the Moyse Hall, will not attempt to make actors and actresses of the students at McGill, but will give instruction in stage effects and possibly in the production of plays; and will aim at giving ex-
