AN APPRECIATIVE PEOPLE HONOR THEIR MINISTER

The following article, over the signature of the pastor of the churches on the Pownal Circuit, appears in the last issue of the Wesleyan. The Guardian congratulates the minister on having earnest working people and congratulate the people on having an appreciative pastor.

After having been closed for a month for cleaning and renovation the Pownal Church was re-opened on Sunday, July 17. In the morning Rev. Wm Harrison, Chairman of the District, preached to a large congregation from the healing of the cripple at the Beautiful Gate. Rev. H. S. Erb (Baptist), of Hazelbrook, was the special preacher in the afternoon. At night the church was crowded to its utmost capacity to hear Dr. Heartz who preached a powerful sermon on "The Name which is above every name."

Last November the church barely escaped being burned to the ground through the bursting of an oil tank and the catastrophe was only averted by the coolness and promptness of the Chapel Steward. But it was badly scorched and blackened and the friends felt that it was unworthy to allow it to continue in that state.

Hence a determined effort was made to renovate it thoroughly. In addition to whitewashing and painting and varnishing, new carpet and new chairs have been put on the platform. This effort is more praiseworthy since it has followed other schemes involving considerable outlay, and the Pownal friends are to be congratulated on the successful achievement of work.

After having been away on a well earned vacation, the pastor and his family returned to Pownal to find the house "swept and garnished."

The roof has been opened on two sides and wide lookouts put in. One of these with a double window, is in the study, and one can look over the roofs of the adjacent buildings for several miles. The alteration has given two good rooms upstairs which, hitherto, have been useless.

After the carpenters and plasterers had gone, a large army of women and few men invaded the house for cleaning, painting and papering. The house is much more comfortable and commodious now than it has ever been. When the haying and harvest are over it is the purpose of the good folks to return and paint and paper the remaining rooms.

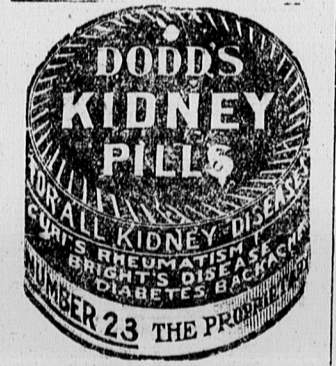
