Led by Elmer Blanchard, better known as "Blanton", the Queen Square team skated off with a 4-1 victory over the much heavier Dunsen's squad, outplaying the University boys in the last two periods.

The winners came back strong and before the period was over had counted twice, each goal coming from the stick of Blanchard. "Blanton" took Wilf Whalen's pass into the blueline for the first count, getting the second unassisted.

By Guardian's Special Wire) MIAMI, Fla., Feb. 27.—The Davis and Goliath dust of the prize fight, huge Primo Carnera's heavy weight title defence tomorrow night against little Tommy Loughran, bubbled today under a back hand slap of the elements that have been torturing the east with blizzards and cold for weeks.

Blustery Rain
Instead of snow, blustery rain dropped down upon Miami to cripple ticket sales and fight preparations as completely as the recent storms did up New York and New England. To add to the gloom the weather man predicted that tomorrow night might be still cooler with the threat of more showers overhanging the situation.

It the bad weather continues the bout probably will be postponed until Thursday night, but the complications that would set in thereby have the Madison Square Garden promoters vowing that the battle will go on unless the situation gets absolutely impossible.

MONTECAL, Feb. 27.—(C.P.)—A sizzling drive from just inside the blue line whizzed into the back of the Montreal goal to give Toronto's league leading Maple Leafs a 2-1 overtime victory over Montreal Maroons here tonight. Young Bill Thomas scored the winning goal in the final stanza, Detroit Red Wings tonight routed New York Rangers 5-1 in a fast, clean game before 5,000 spectators.

In advance to their lead in the American division of the National Hockey League, the high-flying Wings took the lead in the first period, held New York even in the second, and then scored twice in the third when the Rangers desperately used five-man attack in an effort to pull the game out of the fire of the Maroons.
