The cause of numerous diseases and disagreeable habits, heretofore ascribed as constitutional, have been traced directly to the teeth. Bleeding, drilling, robbing, loss of flesh, weak eyes, driving on one side and protruding teeth, rough edges and sharp corners of the teeth, laxative of the bowels, and produce nervousness and irritability; uneven and elongated molars and incisors prevent the proper mastication of the food, producing indigestion and general debility. Decayed molars cause necrosis of the bone, abscesses, nasal discharges, etc. These causes should be removed. Decayed teeth should be removed by extracting or treating, sharp corners and rough edges should be smoothed down and elongated and uneven molars and incisors cut off.
