Interpreting The War

The full effects of these tragic days in the Balkans on the trends of the main battle in the Atlantic are still beyond accurate appraisal. But even a rough estimate provides a startling picture of German achievements in the last 14 days. Some of the items tend to re-leave British gloom, but generally speaking the balance has been heavily weighted in German favor, both militarily and politically.

These entries on the war books can be noted:—
The Yugoslavian army, more than 1,000,000 strong, has been liquidated. The backbone of the Nazi-Fascist war resources of Balkan oil and food, once held vulnerable, has been closed. A German threat to British Mediterranean life lines has been created.

Italy has been bolstered against the chance of internal collapse; the Albanians are restored to her and all the Adriatic coastline across from Italy given into Italian hands, Russia and Turkey as possible active or even passive British helpers have been immobilized, if not worse.

The effect of the Nazi blows in the Balkans on British morale at home cannot yet be fully gauged. It is on that factor alone that German hopes of a complete victory in Europe within a month, during this year, must hinge. There are already definite intimations of a possible German halt in the east, and a turn about to throw the full Nazi power against Britain. Ruthless "retaliatory" Nazi bombing of London was a forerunner of this.

And there are intimations that a Naz-Turkish pact of non-aggression is brewing. Indeed, the possibility that Turkey might stand aside for an Axis thrust—when and if the Balkan barrier falls—spurs Britain to hurry strong imperial forces into Iraq. In the little desert state, where 15 days ago there was a coup against the government, are the great oil fields from which comes much fuel for Britain's Mediterranean fleet.

British return bombing of Berlin within hours after a devastating Nazi raid on London speaks of her determination to fight on to a bitter end. Nor have the Axis successes in the Balkans influenced United States help-for-Britain program—except to quicken it.

Highly equipped of the Italian fleet in repeated actions is another asset item.

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Cape Breton Miners agree To end strike

GLACE BAY, N. S., April 19—(C.P.)—Cape Breton miners at weekend meetings agreed to follow the recommendation of a convention that they return to work tomorrow, ending a strike that has kept 12 mines and 10,000 men idle since Wednesday.

The strike, Nova Scotia's greatest labor stoppage in 19 years, was called in protest against the action of the United Mine Workers of America district executive in signing wage contracts with provincial companies before submitting their provisions to a referendum.

The unofficial convention that called the walkout decided Friday to recommend the men go back to work Monday. Unions ratified the decision during the week-end.

A few hours after the colliery whistles signal the end of the walkout at seven o'clock tomorrow morning, the convention was to re-assemble to receive petitions demanding the resignation of District President D. W. Morrison and secretary-treasurer Alex McKay. The convention had decided to send out the petitions.

The U. M. W. constitution provides that signatures of 20 per cent of the district membership are needed on petitions asking for recall of district officers, but no provision is made for resignation petitions.

President Morrison tonight denied a statement made at the convention Friday, quoting him as having told members of Phalen local here he would resign if the rank and file demanded it.

The President previously had termed the strike "outrage." It was called in 10 Dominion Coal Company pits and two operated by the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company.
