## Robinson 5 to 8 Favorite to stop Fritzie Zivic

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—(AP)—Just about a year ago Fritzie Zivic came off the leaky roof circuit and did the impossible by punching the great Henry Armstrong to the end of the trail.

It might be said that a skinny kid from Harlem made his professional debut in one of the four-round preliminaries, and then sat at ringside and watched Fritzie make it happen.  
Tomorrow night in Madison Square Garden, the kid, Ray (Sugar) Robinson, a brown beanpole with a belt like a bomb, tops off a year of marauding along the victory trail by tangling with Zivic in a 10-rounder that probably will get the winner a shot at Red Cochrane and the world welterweight championship.  
And so far has Sugar come along the road to the jackpot that the betting men have installed him favorite at 5 to 8 to knock off the Driftless and Metal of this flinty generation, not only that but Ray has caught on so hot with the faithful by his banging and his boxing that promoter Mike Jacobs has a pot close to \$45,000.  
Largely because Robinson is rolling merrily along while Zivic has been about as consistent as women's styles, this corner strings along with Ray to grab the brass ring this time.

TORONTO, Oct. 30.—(CP)—The 1941-42 edition of Toronto Map Leafs went on display here tonight before 8,000 customers and it was quite evident the club's greatest strength still rests with Syl Apps and his front-line buddies, Gordie Drillon and Nick Metz. The club opens the National Hockey League season against New York Rangers here Saturday night.  
The Big Three rapped in six goals as the Blues defeated the Whites 9-2 to level the two-game series of intra-club exhibition games at one each. The first game—at Owen Sound last night—went to the Whites 6-2.  
Apps collected three goals, Nick Metz two and Drillon one. Peanus O'Flaherty, striving for a regular berth with the club after one season with New York Americans, picked up two of the Blues' tallies and then Don Metz accounted for one.

## ATTIC ROOM NEEDS AMPLE VENTILATION

If you contemplate finishing an attic room, be sure you provide adequate insulation around it and also provide some ventilation of the air space above. The sun generates a terrific heat at the roof, and if a current of air can be provided over the ceiling of the room, this heat will be constantly carried off, and the walls and ceiling will not be baked as they would be if everything were sealed.  
Louvers at all gable ends are a great help in keeping the upstairs rooms cool in summer. There should be provision made to close them in winter so that no warmth is lost.

## Unsung Canuck Horse provides Race thrills

BALTIMORE, Oct. 30.—(AP)—A record-shattering performance by an unsung, Canadian owned horse, Market Wise's close victory over Hailal in the Pimlico Special and did the impossible by punching the great Henry Armstrong to the end of the trail.

Market Wise, a seven-year-old bay horse from the pampas of Argentina, set a world's record for two miles and 70 yards in winning the second running of the \$5,000-added Exterminator Handicap and almost stole the show from the match race between Market Wise and Hailal in the fifth running of the special. Jockey Al Sheelhammer guided Filisteo, owned by H. C. Hatch of Toronto, over the gruelling route in three minutes, 30 and 4-5 seconds to clip two full seconds off the former world mark of 3:32 4-5 set by Rangover at Detroit in 1935.

Market Wise, \$1,000 bargain colt owned by Lou Turano, Jamaica, N. Y., contractor, came from behind to nip Royce Martin's Hailal by a head in the \$10,000 winner-take-all special, which developed into a hammer and tongs affair.  
But the biggest hand of the day went to Mrs. Willis Frame Kline's Exterminator, the valiant, 26-year-old veteran for which the Exterminator handicap was named. "Old Bones" once was owned by Cmdr. J. K. L. Ross of Montreal.  
He led the field of six to the post with his pony pal, Peanuts, and responded to the sentimental plaudits of the throng by jussing his head and prancing snappily.

## Excursion dates Enables fans to See hockey games

MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 30.—Hockey fans desirous of seeing some of this season's National League hockey teams in action will have an opportunity to attend two games in either Montreal or Toronto on the excursion being operated by the Canadian National Railways to these two cities. The excursion also includes Ottawa, according to an announcement by R. J. S. Weatherston, general passenger agent of the railway here. Tickets are good to return any day up to Wednesday, Nov. 19th, and sleeping car accommodation is available on payment of regular berth charge. Going date for the excursion to Toronto is Thursday, Nov. 6th, and to Montreal and Ottawa, Friday, Nov. 7th, by either the "Ocean Limited," "The Scotian" or "Maritime Express." Hockey games at Toronto are Montreal "Canadiens" vs. "Maple Leafs," Nov. 13th, and Detroit "Red Wings" vs. "Maple Leafs," Nov. 15th. An additional feature is the "Ice Rollies of 1942," Nov. 18th, to 21st inclusive in the Maple Leaf Gardens. Hockey games in Montreal will be Chicago "Black Hawks" vs. "Canadiens" Nov. 8th, and New York "Americans" vs. "Canadiens" Nov. 15th.

## Nicknames used By R. C. A. Pilots

LONDON, Oct. 30.—(CP)—British airmen, in keeping with the practice of their fathers in the first Great War, use a long string of nicknames to identify the various types of aircraft they fly.  
Just as the first Great War's Martinside was known as the "Tin-side," the Spitfire now is called the "Spit."  
Here are the nicknames of some of the others:  
"Albatross"—"Alboafoo"; "Albacore"—"Applecree"; "Anson"—"Annie"; "Fairly Battle"—"Greenhouse"; "Beaufighter"—"Beau"; "Catalina"—"Cat"; "Chesapeake"—"Cheese Cake"; "Hampton"—"Panhandle"; "Lerwick"—"Flying Pig"; "Lysander"—"Liz-zie"; "Hurricane"—"Hurribird"; "Magister"—"Maggie"; "Oxford"—"Oxo"; "Tomawk"—"Tommy"; "Wallace"—"Nellie"; "Wellington"—"Wimpey"; "Whirlwind"—"Crikey."  
Coastal command planes are called "Kipper" Kites and a barrage balloon is called a "Gossage" after Air Marshal Sir Ernest L. Gossage, air officer commander balloon barrage.  
R. A. F. pilots describe the Messerschmitt 109B as the "Yellow Belly," the ME109F as the "Meph" and all unidentified enemy aircraft as "Junkersmitts."

## First Homerun King turns 70

WILKES-BARRE, Pa., Oct. 30.—(AP)—Baseball's first homerun king, John (Bucky) Freeman, rounded out 70 years of living today—still keenly interested in the sport but convinced that bygone days be bypassed.  
"The fans don't give a whoop about what happened 25 or 35 years ago," said the man who clouded 25 homers in 1899 to gain fame and establish a record that remained unsurpassed until Babe Ruth collected 30 round-trippers 20 years later.  
"They live in the present and all this guff about the game being better in the old days does not interest them. Besides I think it's a pretty damned good game as it stands and probably a trifle more interesting—more of a spectacle—than it was in my day."
