short. Mr. Jones, by correspondence,
located him once more and determined
to effect his capture. He went
to Charlottetown and procuring
a warrant, set out one even-
ing to find his man. He soon sighted
Lee, but the New Glasgow episode was
repeated and Lee made good time until
out of sight of the constable. Jones had
however, located the house at which
Lee was supposed to be living and with
that determination that is characteristic
of him, he quietly lay in wait until a
late hour when he spotted the fugitive
entering the house. Satisfied of this,
he had a city policeman accompany him
to the house at daybreak. Leaving his
partner to prevent escape by the rear
door, Jones after much insistence and
against assurances that Lee was not in-
side, gained admission. The object
of his search was found under a bed,
but was shortly afterwards on his way
to Pictou.

Wednesday morning Lee appeared
before Stipendiary Tanner for trial, and
charged only with the crime of theft.
He had previously admitted his guilt,
and as Mr. Craig did not wish to be too
severe upon him, the charge of break-
ing and entering the premises, which
would be punishable by a term in the
penitentiary, was withheld. Stipendiary
Tanner gave him some wholesome ad-
vice, and reminding him of the treat-
ment he might expect if ever again
before the Court, sentenced him to six
months in the County gaol.—Pictou Ad-

RAN TO HER DEATH.

Fearing an Accident Miss Annie Ripley
Rushed in Front of a Train.

MONTREAL Aug. 11. Miss Annie
Ripley, 25 years of age, 48 Sebastopol
street, met a terrible death last night at
the corner of Notre Dame and Ferdinand
streets. She was employed at the Sun
Manufacturing Company, 30 St. Dizier
street, St. Henri, and resided with her
mother and stepfather. Mr. and Mrs.
Pilkington, at 48 Sebastopol street,
Point St. Charles, the stepfather being a
boilermaker in the employ of the Grand
Trunk. After the day's work Miss
Ripley boarded an incoming Lachine car
to return home. When approaching the
curve at the corner of Ferdinand and
Notre Dame streets, the motorman
noticed a Grand Trunk freight train
about to cross the intersection. He im-
mediately reversed the motor. The pas-
sengers, who had not seen the train,
were considerable shaken up, and
frightened, and many of the latter at-
tempted to jump from the car. Among
these was Miss Ripley, who made her
way out at the front of the car and
jumped off.

Evidently she had not seen the ap-
proaching railway train, for she made a
run to cross the track just as the train
passed by.

As she reached the track she stumbled
led and fell across the rails. Just then
the train passed, crushing and tearing
her limbs terribly.

The Notre Dame Hospital ambulance
was at once summoned, and she was
taken to that institution, where, not-
withstanding the efforts of the doctors,
she succumbed to the severe nervous
shock she had sustained passing away
about 9 o'clock.
