NEWSY FARM NOTES

The Buffalo Fly

I read that Australia is being invaded by a new insect pest, which is thought to have been imported from Asia. It is known as the "Buffalo fly" and from certain characteristics it would be safe to say that it is identical with, or closely related to our horn-fly, which by the way was introduced from Europe and first noticed in eastern Pennsylvania in the spring of 1887.

A Profitable Flock

Poultry have advanced from the position of a neglected side-line, housed and fed any old way, to that of one of the more important money-makers of the farm. I have always been interested in the "barnyard fowls" but my book-keeping in connection with them has mostly been the recording of the number and value of the eggs.

On the other hand, the birds cost \$30, and ate 8.5 cwt. of mash which cost \$23.80; 8.5 cwt. of "scratch" costing \$14.05; green feed 75 cents; and shell \$1.60. Lighting cost \$1.05, disinfectant 30 cents; straw \$4.45 and expenses total to \$77.50, thus leaving a profit of \$51.29 on the venture.

Care of Implements

Too often implements are left exposed to the influence of the weather, even by farmers who should know better. In many cases they are left outside all winter, with the result that their period of usefulness is reduced by one-half.

baked by the sun, dripped with the rain, and then frozen, and no wonder they become "dotey" before their time. Iron exposed to these influences, soon rusts, impairing its ease of working and shortening its life.

All implements should be housed after being used, and particularly those used in late fall. Before doing so a coating of some thick lubricating oil should be painted over all polished parts to prevent rusting.

Harness is too often neglected, and its durability lessened. It should be washed and oiled frequently. The washing should be done with tepid water and soap, and a stiff brush.

Heart-to-Heart Talks With Automobile Owners and Drivers on How to Get the Most Out of Their Cars at the Least Expense.

KEEP WINDOW OPEN

In event of an accident, many are inclined to accept as obviously guilty the car owner whose windows were closed in such a manner as to prevent the giving of a signal. It is a point to be kept in mind during cold weather when the tendency is to keep the window closed.

GLYCERINE WILL EXPAND

The level of glycerine solution should be kept three inches below the top of the over-flow pipe. Such a solution expands when warm.

FILTER HAS A LIMIT

There is one thing about the oil filter that every car should bear in mind in Winter; namely, that it is a device for keeping solid impurities out of the oil. When the weather is cold, most of the impurities are liquids—gasoline from the combustion chamber and water from condensation.

MAKES A SAFE BRAKE

Engines with good compression always are good brakes. They are especially good when pavements are slippery because they give equalized braking under nearly all circumstances.

SOME WINTER WISDOM

A positive step on the starter beats a halting or a quick vigorous one for easy starting. If brake and clutch pedals are worn smooth, traction can be improved by fitting them with rubber coverings. Thorough lubrication of the radiator shutter at the start of the season pays.

RELATIVE TO SAFETY

Allow a greater distance between one's own car and that of the man ahead. When a car starts to skid, release

MORE GASOLINE NEEDED

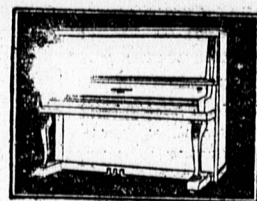
