costly item, as is all hospital equipment, but the management, desirous of providing the best possible facilities for the care of the sick in this section of the Province, deem its installation essential. It might be of interest to know that between four and five hundred infants were born in the institution since its beginning and a total of fifteen hundred patients have already been cared for since its inception. The Sisters and the newly formed Board of Directors are most grateful to the good people of West Prince for their kindness and co-operation on all times.
