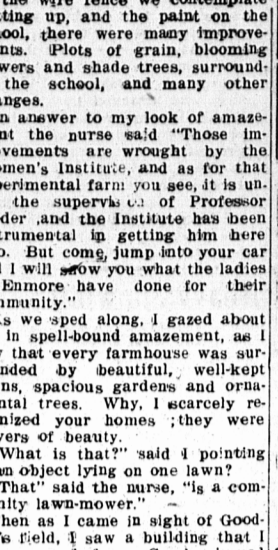
ACROSS CANADA AND BACK.

"Marvellous beyond conception," says a reviewer the glories of the Rocky Mountains. To be fully appreciated they must be seen. To start out on a trip by one's self into this unfamiliar but far-famed paradise-on-earth, to many appears quite a task. Realizing this, Dean Laird, of MacDonald College, and experienced Rocky Mountain Traveler, for the third year in succession, has undertaken to conduct a party through this glorious wonderland.

A special train of dining standard sleeping and observation compartment cars has been chartered, leaving Toronto on July 19th via the Canadian Pacific Railway. Stops will be made at Port Arthur and Fort William, which together form Canada's greatest grain port; Winnipeg Beach, the popular summer resort for Winnipeggers; Winnipeg, Canada's third largest city; Indian Head, the chief trade distributing centre of the Federal Forestry Branch; Regina, the capital of Saskatchewan; Calgary, Alberta's largest city; Banff, the world-famous mountain resort; by automobile for 104 miles over the Banff and Rocky Mountain Traveler, the most spectacular drive in Canada; then through the Doukhabor country to Penticton; along lovely Okanagan Lake and to Vancouver, thence by steamer to Victoria.

Returning the trip will be via the main line of the Canadian Pacific through the great canyons of the Fraser and Thompson Rivers, and through the Selkirk, and Rockies, affording scenery such as can be found nowhere else on earth; Lake Louise, the Pearl of the Rockies, the most perfect gem of scenery in the world; another day at Banff, Edmonton, the Capital of Alberta; Saskatoon, the City of Optimism; Devil's Gap Camp on the Lake of the Woods, near Kenora, thence to Port William, thence one of the fine Coast to Coast Pacific Steamers will be used across Lakes Superior and Huron to Port McNicoll, then rail to Toronto, where the trip will terminate.

Big Falling Off In Sea Fish

OTTAWA, May 19.—A decrease in the catch of sea fish, totalling \$85,750 in value, occurred during last month, as compared with April 1925. In April last 29,353,000 pounds of sea fish valued at \$1,419,592 was taken; while in April 1925 the catch was 35,388,400 pounds, worth \$1,615,323. On the Atlantic coast according to the Department of Marine and Fisheries, there were 18,881,700 pounds of cod, haddock, hake, and pollock taken, compared with 17,720,000 pounds during April 1925. The catch of cod was 17,001,300 pounds, an increase of 2,140,700 pounds. The catch of herring was very small owing to ice conditions on the coast, approximately 145,000 pounds were taken as against 4,144,600 pounds during April of last year. Only 1,270 barrels of sardines were taken during the past month, as contrasted with 4,625 barrels during April 1925. The catch of alewives was somewhat less, 537,600 pounds taken during the month as against 976,400 pounds during the corresponding month last year. The bulk of these were caught in Saint John Harbor, New Brunswick. Owing to ice conditions on the coast, the catch of lobsters was less, 2,122,600 pounds being taken as compared with 3,241,200 pounds in April, 1925. The total catch since the opening of the season in November last was 3,365,000 pounds of which 2,346,200 pounds had been consumed fresh and the balance canned, making 963 cases.

U. S. Traffic To Maritimes

ST. STEPHEN, N. B., May 21.—A bumper crop of United States motor car tourists in the Maritime Provinces is indicated from reports issued from the customs office at the International bridge here. On May 14 a total of 22 cars had passed through, some of them from as far south as Florida, South Carolina, Wisconsin and Michigan, and the majority of them bound for Nova Scotia. Practically all trucks reported in the Maritimes were imported ready for automobile traffic on May 17.

LAUDER WILL CARRY ON SO LONG AS CAN WAGGLE KILT

LONDON, May 21.—America may expect "farwell" tours by Sir Harry Lauder just as long as the famous Scotch comedian can waggle his kilt. "I shall not give up the stage until I can find a better job," said Sir Harry recently. "I shall go right on to the end of the road; I shall never leave my profession until I have to."

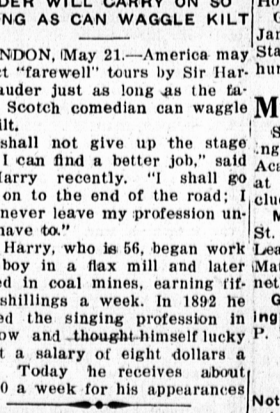
Stones May Reveal What Ancients Thought Of Death

BERKELEY, Cal., May 21.—Religious beliefs regarding life beyond the grave, held by Egyptians and Greeks, may be revealed in the birth of Christ, may be revealed in inscriptions on stones just discovered in the University of California Museum.

Two stones on which inscriptions were carved as the jamb and the lintel of a tomb at Saqqara, which were explored by archeologists about the time the civil war ended, Sennefer probably was an officer of the ancient king of Egypt and served as a guardian of the Valley of the Kings, where the tomb of Tutankhamen was invaded by scientists. He may have been the founder of an hereditary line of keepers whose duty it was to guard the tombs from the depredations of grave robbers, a form of outlawry that is as old as mankind itself, says Dr. H.F. Lutz, professor of Egyptology. He expects to make known a translation of the inscription soon.

THIS CHARMING LITTLE FROCK IS OF WHITE VOILE STITCHED IN COLORS

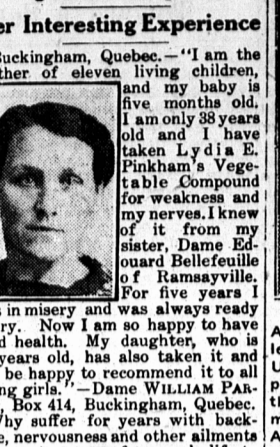

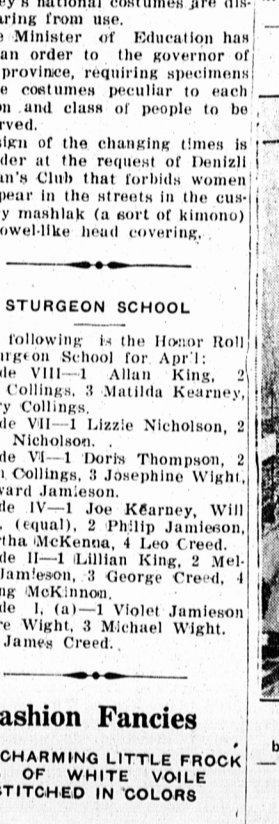
