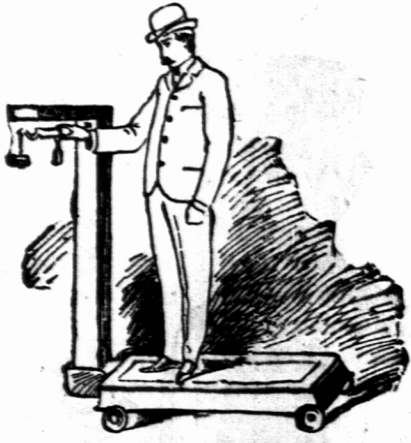

A DESPATCH from New Rochelle, N. Y. Dec. 25 says: John T. Sullivan, an actor, who plays in the White Heather company, and his wife, Rose Coghlan, who arrived from Philadelphia to spend Christmas with their little daughter, Rosalind, thirteen years old, found that the little girl had been severely bitten by a big St. Bernard dog and was in a precarious condition. Miss Coghlan, on learning the news, became hysterical and fainted on the platform. Little Rosalind was playing with Bruce, a prize St. Bernard dog, at the home of Mr. Sullivan, in Neptune Park, when he suddenly turned on her, and buried his teeth in her cheek, tearing the flesh apart for several inches and fracturing the jawbone. Screams of the girl attracted her grandmother, Mrs. A. N. Coghlan, who ran in and found blood pouring from Rosalind's cheek. Dr. Nelson, the family physician, put six stitches in the cheek and incased it in a plaster cast. Rosalind's mother, who was playing at the Walnut street theatre, Philadelphia, at the time of the accident, had made arrangements to go home on Christmas day for the first time in many years. She had sent on a Christmas tree loaded with gifts for the little girl, that had been sent to the mother by friends in San Francisco and other cities. In Philadelphia last evening Mr. Sullivan was showing members of the company how well protected his wife would be if she went out with the two coolie dogs that are used to the play. While he was patting the dogs, one of them, Royal Prince, attacked and bit him on the elbow. [Both father and daughter are known on the Island and have a summer residence at Bay Fortune.]
