ATTEMPT TO ASSASSINATE GOVERNOR

LAHORE, India, Dec. 23.—Sir Geoffrey, Demontmorency, Governor of the Punjab, was wounded above the left hip and in one arm today by two of six shots fired at him as he attended the University convocation. Both wounds were stated to be minor. Two police officials were also hurt in the attempt on the Governor's life. Two students were arrested in connection with the attempt.

18 PIGEONS FIND HAVEN ON VESSEL

Feathered Tribe Welcome Approach of Boston Fishing Schooner, 300 Miles At Sea.

BOSTON, Mass., Dec. 23.—Three hundred miles at sea, 18 pigeons, exhausted and battered in a fight with strong winds, found haven aboard the Boston fishing schooner, L. A. Dunton, which arrived in port today. Chance brought the vessel in the path of the birds who were borne seaward by offshore winds. The schooner was in the extreme northeast corner of Georges Banks last Friday.
The day was one of the meanest experienced on the fishing grounds this season, Captain Felix Hogan said. Out of a heavy vapor which hung over the water the pigeons were literally hurled on to the ship. Some of them struck the rigging and fell exhausted to the decks. Others were blown past the schooner into the wind and then turned to make a landing. Members of the crew tenderly carried them to the engine room where they have since been cared for. When the vessel made port today Captain Hogan endeavored to set them free. They seemed reluctant to go and will be permitted to remain as long as they desire.

Appeal Dismissed Died From Exposure

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 23.—Finding that labor unions have no legal entity and that judgments for damages cannot therefore be given against them, the Supreme Court of Canada today dismissed the appeal in the case of Society Brand Clothes against Amalgamated Workers of America.
The action was taken by Society Brand Clothes, Samuel Hart and Company Limited and the International Tailoring Company Limited, all of Montreal to recover damages as a result of a strike called by the clothing workers union. The Quebec courts found that the clothing companies had suffered damage, but held that judgment could not be given against the defendant because it was not a corporate body, but an incorporated union only. This finding has been affirmed on appeal.
AMHERST, N. S., Dec. 23.—Discovery of fire in the Maple Leaf Mine of the Maritime Coal Company at Joggins has led to temporary closing of the mine, affecting some 250 workers. Airways were being cut off today to prevent circulation, and an investigation is in progress. The mine will remain closed until risk has been eliminated.

TEACHERS' DELEGATION MEETS GOV'T

No Action Yet Taken In Matter of New Education Board.

White Foxes In Winnipeg

WINNIPEG, Man., Dec. 23.—Two beautifully furred white foxes arrived in Winnipeg this morning by Canadian National Express, shipped here by the Churchill Fur Farms, having been trapped in the Hudson Bay district.
As far as can be ascertained no other live white foxes have been brought to Winnipeg and none has passed through this city, with the exception of one, which was shipped to the United States ten or twelve years ago, also from Churchill.

Four Children Burn To Death

CAMILLE DE WOTTON, Que., Dec. 23.—Terrible tragedy stalked into this community yesterday when four young children, trapped and unable to escape from a burning building, lost their lives in a fire which completely destroyed the property of their father, Mr. E. Lecompte. The victims were, Florence, eight years old; Madeleine six years; Gaston five years old and Raymond eight months.
After fixing the stove, the father went to the barn to do his morning chores. While he was away the stove pipes apparently became overheated, causing flames to ignite in the walls and ceiling.

Rumored That Meighen Will Enter Cabinet

WINNIPEG, Man., Dec. 23.—The Manitoba Free Press publishes the following Ottawa despatch this afternoon: "Despite semi-official denials, rumors persist that Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen will become Minister of Finance in the Bennett Ministry. It was stated, further, that whether or not he enters the Cabinet, he will shortly come back to Parliament, perhaps in the by-election to be held in Hamilton east. This by-election will be brought on early in the new year and Conservatives in Ottawa, who know Mr. Meighen well, think there is more than an outside chance of his accepting the nomination. But while the rumors of his entry into the Cabinet are to be met on every hand, there is still no official basis for them, and it may be stated without qualification that there have not yet been overtures of any kind. The first move in such an arrangement would have, of necessity, to come from Bennett.
The significance which may properly be attached to the rumors is that many influential Conservatives have approached Mr. Meighen privately with the suggestion that, if invited, he should seriously consider the proposal to enter the Cabinet; and the persistence of the rumor indicates, as well, that Mr. Meighen would consider an offer very seriously in fact, might accept it."
