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Chicago Defeats Cards In National League Opener

Pittsburg Pirates Turn Back Cincinnati Reds 4-1 — Cubs Impressive In 3-0 Win.

NEW YORK, April 12 — Lon Warneke, pride of the Ozarks, muffled the big St. Louis Cardinal gun with a great four-hit pitching performance at Chicago today to send the Cubs off on their National League pennant campaign with a shut out victory, 6-0.

A four-hit barrage off Dizzy Dean in the second inning, opened by young Frank Demaree, reserve trooper for the injured Kiki Cuyler, gave the Cubs all their runs as the crowd of 25,000 quaffed beer and cheered. Warneke clicked impressively and it was all the Cubs needed although they nicked Dean and his successor, Tex Carleton for seven more safe blows.

Pittsburg's Pirates chalked up one victory on their way to a possible National League pennant at Cincinnati defeating the Cincinnati Reds 4 to 1 in the season's opening game.

Two doubles by Suhr, and a triple by Paul Waner, helped humble St. Johnson, while the Redland crew was helpless before Swift's deliveries.

The Reds attempted a ninth inning rally but Lomardi hit into a double play after Hafey and Moore had singled, to end the game. A crowd of 25,305 saw the contest.

One of the most contentious features of the Bill is the clause designed to reserve the Canadian coastal trade for Canadian ships. The bill was first introduced in the Upper House and then referred to a standing committee where various interests were invited to present their views. The Committee encountered a snag in certain constitutional difficulties and it is believed it will take some little time to work out a satisfactory solution.

The Senators gave third and final reading today to a few bills sent up from the House of Commons and already advanced through the preliminary stages. They included the Bill to amend the Criminal Code with respect to firearms, the Bill amending the Penitentiaries Act and the Bill amending the Royal Canadian Mounted Police Act.

Robinson said with an embassy in Washington, Russian leaders would utilize it as a "central point for carrying on their admitted efforts to destroy the American republic."

Asserting Russia "had no intention of destroying the Government of the United States and I know perfectly well they couldn't destroy it if they wanted to," Borah said.

"We are about to engage in a world Economic Conference. How are we going to adjust the world economic affairs and leave Russia out? We are in a Disarmament Conference. How are you going to reach a decision without taking Russia into consideration?"

"How are you going to establish peace with one-sixth of the world's surface outside the family of nations? How are you going to adjust any of these questions without considering this great nation?"

Ten thousand four hundred and forty-eight separate shipments, involving 3,704,210 containers of plants of all kinds and descriptions from all parts of the world were examined last year by the entomological inspection staff of the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, at ten ports of importation and at two of the other inspection districts to prevent the entry into Canada of insect pests and plant diseases. Among the most important pests intercepted were the European Earwig, the Brown-tailed Moth, Pine Shoot Moth, Granary weevils, bulb flies and greenhouse pests.

HAWKS ARE ON RETURN JOURNEY Opening Of The American League Series Yesterday

Will Be Presented With Allan Cup At Toronto. Players May Stop Over To Pay Visits.

VANCOUVER, April 12—Moncton Hawks, the great hockey machine from the Maritime Provinces, were eastward-bound tonight with the highest honors in Canadian amateur hockey. Victors over Saskatoon Quakers, western finalists, in two straight games, Hawks, retained for Eastern Canada for another year the Allan Cup, symbolic of amateur hockey supremacy in the Dominion when they turned back the Quakers via the shut out route.

Stopping off at Toronto, the champions will be presented with the historic cup they will take to the Maritimes for its first sojourn there. Regular train stops will be made at Winnipeg and Montreal but some of the boys, with homes in the Prairie Provinces, may possibly stop over to visit relatives, later catching up with the team, if possible, in Montreal. A stop at Quebec City has not been arranged. No changes in the schedule were made when the team left here this afternoon.

Free from hockey wars until next season, Hawks piled into their coach eager to return with their trophy to their enthusiastic supporters in Moncton. And with one accord their parting words were: "We're not through. We'll be back in the battle again next year."

Saskatoon Quakers left on the same train, en route to their homes in Saskatchewan.

Washington Senators, Chicago White Sox And Cleveland Triumph In Opening Games.

NEW YORK, April 2—Despite a bad break in the weather in the eastern half of the baseball belt, for the second successive year, the Major League staged five of their eight scheduled opening games today, all to the tune of sparkling pitching performances.

Turnstiles clicked to the presence of nearly 100,000 cash customers in the three American League and two National League cities where festivities and the attendance of many notables marked the return of the big show.

NEW YORK, April 12—The Washington Senators at home today took the presence of President Roosevelt as a good luck omen, and with a 4 to 1 victory over the Philadelphia Athletics sent the chief executive back to the White House shaking his head and himself above his head in answer to the opening game cheers of 24,000 fans.

Youthful Joe Cronin, starting his first game as manager of the Senators, banged out three singles in four attempts to lead the Washington attack, which prospered behind the six-hit pitching of Al Crowder and the hitless hurling of Alphonse Thomas during the last two innings.

The veteran Connie Mack was forced to send the Athletics into the season opener with a makeshift line-up. The one-time murderers row was absent.

The Philadelphia manager sent Tony Freitas, diminutive left hander, to the mound in place of Lefty Grove, put Dibs Williams on first and inserted a newcomer, Edward Cihocki, at shortstop. The rookie responded with a triple in the third, but that, coupled with doubles by Cramer and Johnson, accounted for most of the Athletics heavy hitting. None of the extra base blows figured in Philadelphia's lone run.

While Cronin, Clark Griffith, President of the Washington club, and Vice-President Garner stood by the President's seat after shaking hands, the President raised the ball above his head and without rising tossed a loop over the top of the circle of cameramen. Kerr, Senator utility man, caught the ball, stuck it in his pocket and ran before anybody could suggest that he give it back.

A costly outfield error, an intentional pass and three singles in the 13th inning broke up a sparkling pitchers' duel between Tommy Bridges of the Tigers and Clint Brown of the Indians at Detroit and enabled Cleveland to win an overtime season opener 4 to 1.

Bridges had allowed the Indians only four hits and the score was 1 to 1 when Gerald Walker dropped Cissell's fly in the 13th with one out. Cissell took second. Vosmik lined out and Morgan was purposely passed. Then Kamm, Spencer and Brown singled to break up the ball game. Jo-Jo

White doubled as a pinch batter for the Tigers, Detroit's seventh hit, but died on base.

Durham and Heving allowed the St. Louis Browns only four hits and the Chicago White Sox won the opening game of the season at St. Louis 4 to 2. Ralph Kress who once wore a Brownie uniform drove in three runs for Chicago. The other Sox run was a homer by Al Simmons in the fourth. Attendance was only 4,500 despite almost ideal weather and the attraction of beer.

Although Dr. Van Dyke had been ill for more than a year, his death today was unexpected.

An intimate friend of Woodrow Wilson, when the latter was President of Princeton University, Dr. Van Dyke received his appointment as Minister to the Netherlands after his friend became President of the United States.

A man of great versatility, Dr. Van Dyke was the author of many books of prose and verse, an excellent preacher, a diplomat, and a lover of humanity.
