ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

THE Bonavista arrived last night at seven o'clock with a large cargo of general merchandise.

Rev. W. Dawson preached again in the First Methodist Church yesterday to large audiences. At the evening service a solo was beautifully sung by Mr. Gilbert.

THE pulpit of St. James church last night was occupied by Prof. Andrews of Mount Allison who preached an eloquent sermon on The Power of Unseen Things from II. Cor. 17, 18. "For our light affliction which is but for a moment worketh for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory. While we look not at things which are seen but at the things which are not seen; for the things which are seen are temporal; but the things which are not seen are eternal."

THERE were over one hundred passengers to Crapaud by the S S City of London on Saturday afternoon. While waiting for rise of tide at Crapaud many of the excursionists visited friends, an unexpected pleasure, while others partook of lunch including a cup of the steward's new famous tea. The weather was all that could be desired both going and returning and a jolly good time was indulged in with vocal and instrumental music, games, etc. Charlottetown was reached at midnight. The tide on Saturday was the lowest on record.

PASSED away at Cornwall on the twenty-seventh of June, Elizabeth Beer, widow of the late George Rodd Pethick and daughter of the late John and Elizabeth Beer of Devonshire, England. Mrs. Pethick was born in Wales, England, and came to Prince Edward Island with her parents over sixty five years ago. Deceased was of quiet nature, a kind neighbor and sympathetic friend. The large funeral which followed her to her last resting place in the Cornwall cemetery told of her many friends. She leaves to mourn, besides three brothers and three sisters one daughter at home who has the sympathy of the community in her sad bereavement.

MANY friends in Charlottetown and throughout the province will be pleased to learn that L. E. Frowse with his wife and family will return in the course of several months from Sydney and again take up their permanent residence in this city. Mr. Frowse has been one of our most public spirited citizens and he will be warmly welcomed.

THE excursion for the Summer School of Science visitors and others who wish to enjoy a grand day's outing, will be a most interesting one. The City of London leaves this morning at nine o'clock and stops will be made at Halliday's and Brush wharves and also on the island in Orwell Bay. The excursion is being got up by the Tourist Association and it is hoped it will be encouraged sufficiently by citizens to insure another such outing before the school closes.

His Excellency Archbishop Sbarretti, Papal delegate to Canada will arrive in the city by the Princess. On his arrival he will be met by the bishop and clergy. A procession will be formed in which the following societies will take part in regalia: Benevolent Irish Society, Ancient Order of Hibernians, Catholic Mutual Benefit Association, Knights of Columbus, and the League of the Cross Band. The League of the Cross Society will escort His Excellency to the station on the morning of his departure. The route of the procession will be illuminated and lines of electric lights are now being placed in position. At the Cathedral he will be presented with an address by the clergy and laity, after which the benediction and the blessed sacrament will be given. His Excellency will remain here for two or three days. On Tuesday evening a public reception will be held at the Palace from eight to ten.
