**COSTLY SPORT IN FISHING.**

A correspondent of the New York Sun tells of the big sums paid by Americans and others for salmon fishing privileges in New Brunswick and Quebec, and how these have grown in value during recent years. Some years ago the river Restigouche and its tributaries was leased for \$150 a year. Now a portion of the river brings in a rental of thousands of dollars yearly. Over \$400,000 has actually been paid to riparian proprietors by the present holders of fishing rights, and the remaining rights could not be bought for half a million. The Restigouche Salmon Club is made up of thirty-two members including many multi-millionaires, and its shares are eagerly sought at \$10,000 each. The main clubhouse is at the junction of the Restigouche and Metapedia, and here a New York chef prepares the repasts at which no member is ever permitted to sit down except in full dress.

The fishing rights on the Quebec side of the Restigouche were bought in 1880 for \$1500 and changed hands in 1895 at \$35,000 an increase of 2,300 per cent in fifteen years. The Patapedia pools, bought for \$2,000 in 1882 were sold to the present proprietors in 1894 for \$25,000. In 1889 Robert Goelet paid \$20,000 for three quarters of a mile on the Quebec side of the Restigouche. Later Mr. Goelet purchased the McAndrew property fishing privilege for \$45,000. It had cost McAndrew \$5,000 thirteen years before. A fishing privilege at the mouth of the Upsalquitch was sold to Mr. Payne of Cleveland in 1895 for \$35,000.

The Kedgewick pools bought a few years ago for \$7,000 could not now be had for \$70,000. For a portion of the fishing rights on the Cascapedia the Quebec Government receives \$8,500 a year

from the Cascapedia Salmon Club, and could easily obtain a quarter of a million for the entire fishing rights of the river. This river was a favorite fishing ground for Lords Lorne, Lansdowne, Stanley, President Arthur and others. James J. Hill pays \$3,000 a year for a lease of the St. John river in Labrador. The Bonaventure Salmon Club composed mostly of Americans, pays \$2,000 a year for the lease of Bonaventure river. Years ago Louis Cabot of Boston purchased at a low figure the lower part of the grand river Gaspé, and could now get \$100,000 for his purchase.

Tea, coffee and cocoa together cost the people of the United States \$2.61 per head yearly while intoxicating liquors cost \$15.54 per head.

The opening of a notable new lock on the Trent Canal some days ago was witnessed by many Canadian public men including the representatives of Prince Edward Island. The lock has a lift of 65 feet and in that particular excels all work of the kind in America or the world. Better still it is the work of Canadian engineers, Canadian skilled labor, Canadian materials and money directed by the Government of this country. The Trent Canal is to a large extent a misnomer. The system is mainly made up of river channels, which with artificial aids will yet connect Georgian Bay with Lake Ontario, affording a short cut of 203 miles from the upper to the lower lakes. One hundred and ninety miles are now navigable for barges of 800 tons. Four millions have been expended and five millions more are required to complete the work. It will afford a saving of 250 miles over the Welland Canal route.

It now transpires that Lord Dundonald has been officially requested by the Home Government to return to England. No section of the British press has approved of his course in publicly speaking as he did in censure of the Canadian Government under which he held office.

Webster City, Iowa, not only owns its water works, street railway, electric lighting, power and heating plants, with other public utilities, but is about to establish a civic newspaper. One main object of the new enterprise will be to advocate and extend the principle of civic ownership, to which some of the existing newspapers there are opposed.

The British press speaks in warlike tones over the seizure of our ships by Russian war vessels. There is no need of this. Any repetition of the offence is easily preventable. There are enough British warships idle to police the Red Sea and all the seven seas for that matter, and afford ample protection to British commerce. The seized mail steamer has not been taken to a Russian port but to Alexandria, and if Britain demands it she must be set at liberty.

The Examiner thinks it "outrageous" that the Hon. Mr. Cumiskey should be acting Premier instead of Hon. Mr. Rogers, the latter being "the elder and the abler man." There may be some force in the contention that as the Acting Premier signs all cheques, and is also head of the greatest spending department there is not the same safeguard over the payments to contractors as there would be if another minister signed the cheques for payment. But in any case the entire cabinet is responsible for what is done, and The Examiner itself has not charged that any wrongful payments have been made because Mr. Cumiskey signs the cheques.

**WOMAN JUMPED OVERBOARD.**

PLYMOUTH, Eng., July 18.—Tragedy again marked the homeward voyage of the North German Lloyd steamer Kaiser William II. On the arrival of the vessel here it was announced that a second class passenger Mrs. Lischitz had committed suicide by jumping overboard when the ship was out one day from New York.
