The Ten Dollar Unit

A boy must subscribe at least \$10, or he may give more, in \$10 units, but not less.

He may earn the money, deduct it from his own savings, or take it out of his allowance. But, he should not solicit the money.

Certificates

When a boy has given \$10, or more units of \$10 each, he will receive a beautifully engraved certificate. In the meantime, each time a boy pays one dollar, a coupon is detached and given him as a receipt. Payments must be completed by October 1st, 1918.

PRACTICAL DAILY GUIDE FOR VACANT LOT AND BACKYARD GARDENERS ENLISTED IN GREATER PRODUCTION CAMPAIGN.

Issued by the Canada Food Board in collaboration with experts on the staff of the Dominion Experimental Farm.

—CHOOSE YOUR SEED.—Discrimination in the purchase of seed is very important. There is scarcity this year and for that reason none must be wasted. In the following list, based on tests made at the Experimental Farms and stations in Canada, several varieties of parallel merit are suggested, so that it is not possible to get one kind the other may be obtainable.

—Potatoes:—Irish Cobbler or Eureka Extra Early, Green Mountain, Gold Coin, Wee MacGregor, Farman No. 1, Early Ohio.

—Beets:—Crosby Egyptian, Detroit Dark Red and Early Model.

—Carrots:—Chapman, Danvers Half Long, Early Scarlet Horn.

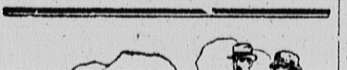
—Corn:—(Extra early) Early Malcoln, Malakoff, Peep O'Day, Golden Bantam, Early Evergreen or Black Mexican, Country Gentleman and Stowells Evergreen.

—Peas:—Gregory Surprise, Thos. Laxon, Grandis, Net Excelsior, American Wonder, Sutton Early Giant, Telephone, Champion of England, Quot Content, McLean Advancer, Sutton Excelsior and Premier Gem.

—Beans:—(Round Pod Wax) Round Pod Kidney Wax, Pencil Pod and Brittle Wax, Wardwell Kidney Wax, Hodson Wax; (Green Pod) Stringless Green Pod and Early Red Valentine, Refugee or 1000 1 (late); Lima and Pole beans are not very satisfactory except where the season is long and warm. Scarlet Runner is the most reliable Pole bean but Kentucky Wonder is one of the best in quality.

—Cabbage:—Early Jersey Wakefield, Copenhagen Market, Sutton Excelsior, medium; Danish Ballhead and Drumhead Savory, late; Red Dutch.

SOLDIER HAS SIGHT RESTORED BY A SIMPLE OPERATION

WASHINGTON, May 4.—Blinded by a shell explosion at the battle of Gallipoli, in the early months of the war Thomas Skevhill, an Anzac private, has his sight restored here today by a simple operation on the vertebrae of his neck. Examination of Skevhill, who has been lecturing throughout the country in the interests of the Third Liberty Loan, showed a vertebrae at the head of the spinal column slightly out of position, and a correction was easily made with the result that the blindness was dispelled. Physicians explained that the displaced vertebrae had impaired functions of nerves indispensable to sight.

P. E. I. MAN KILLED IN MASSACHUSETTS.

Y. M. C. A. LOSS IN CAPTURED TERRITORY PLACED AT A MILLION
TORONTO, May 4.—A cable to the National Council of the Y. M. C. A. from C. W. Bishop, its representative in London, says a revised estimate of the loss sustained by the British Y. M. C. A. in the territory recently captured by the Germans in France puts the figures at one million dollars. One hundred huts were destroyed and two British Y. M. C. A. secretaries were wounded.
Mr. Bishop also sends word of the arrival in London of Sir John Gibson, former Lieutenant-Governor, of Ontario, who has been inspecting the

work of the Y. M. C. A. in Flanders and France. Sir John Gibson especially commends the work in Paris where he formally opened the Hotel D'Jona, the finest soldiers' club and hotel in the French capital to be operated by the Canadian Y. M. C. A.
