RELIGIOUS SERVICES

TRINITY UNITED CHURCH

"God is our refuge and strength, A very present help in trouble." The 46th Psalm expressive of our confidence in God was the scripture lesson for responsive reading. A week ago, Rev. W. M. Ryan brought a message as to the foundation upon which christians should build and the necessity that every man take heed how he buildeth thereon. Yesterday Rev. J. S. Bonnell's sermon was a fitting complement as he spoke to a congregation that filled this large Church on The Fatherhood of God, his text being John 14-9 "He that hath seen me hath seen the Father." The immensity of the universe, God the Lord of Hosts at the centre controlling all, the revelation of Jesus presenting God as our Father and revealing his love so that no matter how we may wander into the far country we are still God's sons and he is ever longing for our return. He will have mercy and abundant pardon. The story was simply beautifully and appealingly told by Mr. Bonnell, who was warmly greeted and welcomed to Trinity pulpit.

At the evening worship, Rev. C. N. Brown, M.A., spoke from the text Mark 8-36, "What shall it profit a man if he shall gain the whole world and lose his own soul."

Miss Lillian McKenzie was organist for the day and had prepared a service of praise most excellent in every way. In the morning, Miss Margaret Sterns sang Willard's "Ave Maria," and Mr. Raoul Raymond sang "Within these sacred bowers" from "The Magic Flute," by Mozart and in the evening Mrs. Covey, soloist in St. Andrew's Church, Halifax, sang, "The Holy City" and Mr. Leigh Dingwell presented "Crossing the bar." It would be difficult to get together in this city, a more accomplished quartet of vocalists. Each one merits unstinted praise and added greatly to the spirit of worship which prevailed.

The religions of the Canadian people as revealed by the census shows that the United Church is the largest Protestant body with 2,016,772 or 19.44 per cent of the population. The Anglicans came next with 1,635,259, or 15.76 per cent and the Presbyterians are further down the list with 870,496. It is pleasing to be associated with a large, powerful and united body of Christians who we believe are all filled with a holy desire for the extension of Christ's Kingdom and the spreading abroad of the Gospel of our blessed Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. In Union there is strength. Let the spirit of Union grow mightily.

Deep Sympathy For Relatives Of Drowning Victims

Further details of the double drowning tragedy at McLure's Mill Pond, Murray River, on Aug. 17, are as follows. The young men, James J. Hume and William Matheson, both of Iris, were fishing at the time in a small flat bottomed boat. They had left their homes in the forenoon to pick blueberries. After filling their pails they started back by way of Floating Bridge, arriving there at about six o'clock and decided to stay for a short while to do some trout fishing, while Mr. Hume's son Donald, who accompanied them went on home for a horse and wagon to fetch the men with their pails. He returned to the bridge at about 7.30 o'clock and found his father and Mr. Matheson standing up in the boat fishing about three hundred yards from the bridge. He called to them, telling them it was time to come home and they shouted back that they would be right in. Donald waited around for a while and when he next looked for the boat it was upturned. He went for help but the bodies were not recovered until Thursday morning at six o'clock. A watch in Mr. Hume's pocket stopped at 7.50 Mr. Matheson and Mr. Hume were close friends all their lives, had a double wedding, and lived across the road from one another. Both men left families of small children. A double funeral service, conducted by Rev. Allister Murray, of Caledonia Presbyterian Church, was held at Mr. Matheson's home.

The tragedy has cast a gloom over the entire community, where both men were well known and highly respected. Mr. Matheson was a son of Angus Matheson, of Iris, and was born at Hopfield thirty-seven years ago. Besides a wife and four children, there are left to mourn, his father, three brothers, Angus, Glen Forest, Malcolm, of Watertown, U.S.A., and John, of Pictou. Mr. Matheson was a returned soldier, and returned men formed in two ranks when the flag draped coffin was borne to the hearse. The ball peavers were D. Bears, J. MacBeth, J. A. MacKenzie, A. MacDonald, J. MacRae, H. Keenan.

James Hume was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Peter G. Hume, of Iris. He was formerly married to Myrtle Keenan, of Murray River, who preceded him about twelve years.

To this union three children were born, two of which are living, Donald and Freeman. About seven years ago he married Katherine Stewart, of Caledonia, who is left to mourn, with three small children. Besides his wife and children, he leaves his sorrowing parents and two brothers, Donald, of Philadelphia and Murdoch, of Rosindale, U. S. A. Pall bearers were: C. Nicolle, B. A. Reynolds, L. Miller, G. Lowe, N. MacPherson and H. Bonnell.

The funeral was the largest ever held in the vicinity of Iris. The many beautiful flowers bore evidence of the high esteem in which both men were held. The Guardian joins with the community in extending deepest sympathy to the bereaved families.—H.
