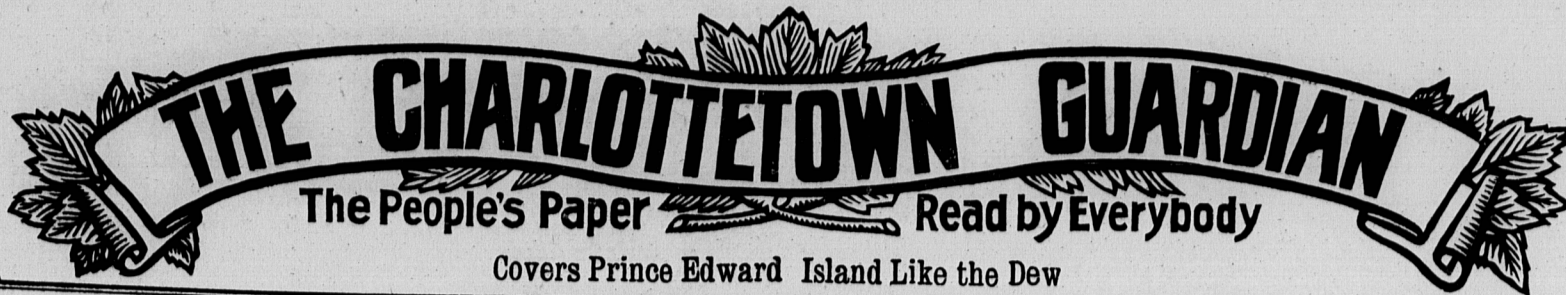

Rousing Conservative Demonstration At Victoria

Unemployment & Constricted Purchasing Power

In Both Rural And Industrial Areas, Together With Lower Wage And Reduced Farm Product Prices, Responsible For Business Depression In Dominion, Says Cooperative Union Of Canada.

EGYPTIAN SITUATION IS SERIOUS

Fourteen Killed In Rioting In Alexandria; 250 Reported Seriously Injured.

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, July 15.—Fourteen persons of whom eight were Europeans, were killed in serious rioting during a general strike here today. About 250 persons were reported injured, many of them seriously. One of the dead was an Italian citizen.
CAIRO, Egypt, July 15.—The Exchange Telegraph Company reported tonight that Mohamed Ali Square in Alexandria, Cairo had been occupied by a detachment of Egyptian army troops and that reinforcements were being rushed from Cairo.

TORONTO, Ont., July 15.—Constricted purchasing power in both rural and industrial areas of Canada, owing largely to reduced farm product prices, lower wages and unemployment is reflected as the 1929 report of the executive of the Co-operative Union of Canada, submitted at the opening of the congress of the Union today. Eighteen of the Unions affiliated retail societies reported a fall in turnover during the year, while ten recorded increases, the net surplus of profit of the reporting societies was \$294,642, \$48,107 less than the previous years profit. The societies share capital decreased by \$32,756 to \$556,614. The executive stated that only two societies had failed to meet their expenses for the year and their total loss was only \$1,103. This result is described as gratifying in view of the heavy shrinkage in business during the depression era in the latter half of last year.
The executive attributes the societies' reduced turnover to the lower price obtainable for farm products and to the industrial depression which has meant lower wages and men out of work.

Grit Candidates Again Sidestep Butter Issue

Tremendous Ovation Tendered Messrs. McLure And Myers In Home District Of Popular Conservative Candidate. Audience Takes Up Challenge With Liberal Candidates On Butter Issue.

Gloom sat heavily on the exponents of Washington-made potato tariffs and free New Zealand butter at Victoria hall last night, where one of the most enthusiastic demonstrations in the campaign was tendered the Conservative candidates.

Challenged—this time by the audience—to state where they stood on the New Zealand butter treaty, neither Mr. Jenkins nor Mr. Macmillan offered to say whether they approved or disapproved of it, or whether, if elected, they would support or oppose a similar treaty.

CAR FERRY CONTRACT

"They claim great credit for getting the second car ferry," he said. "However, we have not seen that car ferry yet. BELOVED BISHOP LAID TO REST

Largest Funeral Procession in Years Left Basilica Yesterday Morning. Eloquent Panegyric By Bishop Morrison of Antigonish.

Sadly and slowly a mourning concourse, representative of his entire episcopal district, followed in the funeral train of His Lordship, Right Rev. Louis J. O'Leary, Bishop of Charlottetown, who was laid to rest yesterday morning in the Roman Catholic Cemetery. The funeral, which took place from St. Dunstan's Basilica, was the largest held in the city for many years, and was attended by visiting clergy from many points in the Dominion who assembled to pay tribute to the beloved dignitary.

The Basilica was thronged with citizens of all denominations, many being unable to gain admittance. At 10 o'clock yesterday morning Solemn Pontifical Requiem High Mass was celebrated at the Basilica by Most Reverend Henry J. O'Leary, of Edmonton, brother of the deceased, assisted as follows: High Priest, Rev. G. McLellan, D. D.; Deacons of Honor, Rev. James Murphy, D. D., Rev. R. V. McKenzie; Deacon of the Mass, Rev. N. Poirier; Sub-Deacon of the Mass, Rev. C. McCarthy; Master of Ceremonies, Rev. P. McMahon, D. D.; Censor bearer, Rev. Andre Arsenault, Acilytes, Rev. J. A. Sullivan, Rev. Urban Gillis.

An eloquent and touching sermon was delivered by Right Rev. James Morrison, Bishop of Antigonish, who took for his text, St. John, 17, the passage containing the prayer of the Lord uttered before His death and passion. The assemblage is gathered.

CONSERVATIVE LEADER HITS FROM SHOULDER

Standing Room At Premium At Three Rivers, Quebec, to Hear Man Of The Hour—Banners Of Welcome Carried In The Audience.

THREE RIVERS, Que., July 15.—Strongly attacking the tariff policies of Liberal administration, Hon. R. B. Bennett closed his election campaign in Quebec here late this afternoon. The Conservative Chiefstain warned his audience against false cries of war with India and declared the issue should be faced in a straightforward manner. Do you believe, the Conservative Chiefstain exclaimed in a fair deal, an even chance for Canadians? Do you believe Canadians should have a chance to work on the raw materials of this country in Canada? Do you believe Canada's industry should have the opportunity to supply the wants of Canadian consumers? If you do, vote for us. But if you believe our boys and girls should grow up to manhood and womanhood estate and then have to go to the United States to find jobs—then vote for the Liberals. If you want to give work to Japan, Czechoslovakia or some other country in place of Canada, vote for the Liberals.

THE EXODUS

For the exodus of Canadians to the United States, Mr. Bennett had caustic references. Why, he said, Premier Taschereau said at Queens University that if the number who

had left Canada were known it would cause a surprise. One million and a quarter Canadians had left this country since the advent of the King Government into office, the Conservative Leader declared, and he regretted they were the pick of our sons and daughters. Why did they not stay here? Because there was no work.

The Quebec Minister of Agriculture, Mr. Bennett proceeded, had commented on the fact that fifty per cent of certain products consumed in this Province had been imported. Give Canadians a chance, the Opposition Chiefstain asked.

The Armories where Mr. Bennett spoke was filled with people standing to hear the address. In the front of the building, four sets of amplifiers carried his words to an overflow crowd. Boys elbowed their way through the people carrying banners of welcome, while the speakers platform was arranged in Conservative colors.

Leaving Sherbrooke this morning, Mr. Bennett was afforded a civic welcome at Richmond and Drummondville. Several times he was obliged to speak at the unscheduled meetings at the request of the people. Tomorrow, the Conservative Chiefstain will address meetings at Perth and Renfrew.

OBSERVERS SEE MARKED SWING TO MR. BENNETT

Reports From All Provinces Indicate Big Conservative Victory—Two Ottawa Seats In Bennett Column.

With only two weeks of campaigning left and the contending parties coming down the home stretch, it is becoming less difficult to determine with at least some degree of accuracy how the campaign is shaping itself throughout the country. As is usual in all general elections, both parties are considering it good propaganda to put forward claims of victory but, reading between the lines of the party forecasts, and taking into account the views and predictions of impartial and competent observers, including the large business houses of the country, it is easily apparent that there is an unmistakable swing in favor of Mr. Bennett, that it has been growing in momentum during the past week, and that the general

Trial Of Anti Begins To-Day

The July term of the Supreme Court at Georgetown opened yesterday with Chief Justice Mathieson presiding. The Grand Jury were empaneled as follows: Martin MacKinnon (foreman); John Fitzpatrick, Patrick P. Morrison, William Steele, Charles Macdonald, Wallace Allen, A. A. Macdonald, John Fraser, M. McLeod, Charles Parker, A. J. McAdams, and Spencer Moore.
His Lordship in addressing the jury dealt especially with the case of the King vs. Anti and Posselt, charged with the murder of Rodriguez, boat-swain of the steamer "Winding Gulf." He reviewed the circumstances in connection with that case and the evidence the jury would consider. His Lordship also fully explained the duties of the Grand Jury.
True bills were found against each of Anti and Posselt. The former will appear for trial today. Messrs David Mathieson, K. J. Martin, and S. S. Hessian will appear for the accused. Mr. Thane Campbell, Attorney-General will conduct the prosecution.

What King Subsidy Will Accomplish

If it be a sum sufficient to cover our bare necessities it must be over a million dollars per annum, whereas it is rumored Mr. King estimates the Audit Board will recommend only \$400,000.

After Premier King's visit here the report was circulated that he had stated the Audit Board (officials of the Government) would recommend a subsidy of \$400,000 (inclusive of the \$125,000 interim payment) which he estimated would be sufficient to pay our old age pensions.
