## IN THIS CORNER

According to spectators who witnessed the match Abbies lost several great scoring chances by poor work around the net, and if this continues this evening they will certainly be relegated to the sidelines in quick order.

Even with the team clicking in all departments four goals is a mighty big lead to overcome and it is doubtful if the locals at their best are four goals better than the Milton team.

But with their backs firmly against the wall, and after a great string of exhibition victories at that Abbies gave notice last night that they will be in there tonight seeking goals from the opening whistle.

They will have to go out and force the pace all the way and if they stand up to it they might make it very interesting but at any rate fans can be sure of witnessing a wide-open encounter tonight.

Success of Milton in their first game, however, is only an example of the improvement that is being noted in hockey in all the rural centres throughout the Island. And a big change has come over these same teams with regard to their ability.

Time was, and it is not too far distant, when a country team was looked upon as just a means of giving a city squad a practice. Even teams themselves, with a few exceptions, were hesitant about entering any playdowns.

The reason of course was that they considered themselves far below the standard of city teams, which may or may not have been true, at any rate the competition was never forthcoming.

Now, however, all this is changing.

### Set Dates For Canadian Open

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Feb. 13—(CP)—The Canadian open golf tournament next summer at Riverside, near here, will be held Aug. 17, 18, and 19, according to a telegram received here tonight from P. N. Robertson, Saint John, who is now in New York. He is secretary of the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island Golf Association.

Sam Sneed, of White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia, will defend his championship, Mr. Robertson said.

## Drillon Tops Ex-Maritimers In Scoring

MONTREAL, Feb. 13—(CP)—Moncton's Gordie Drillon continues to lead the list of former Maritime stars now performing in the National Hockey League, and from all indications it's going to take something in the way of a major reversal of form to move him out of the leading position.

Drillon passed a quiet week until Sunday night, and then suddenly broke out in one of his accustomed point-getting rushes to collect two goals and an assist against Canadiens to keep his own-point lead intact. His 15 goals and 11 assists for 26 points gives him a comfortable margin over Eddie Wiseman of Americans and Joffre Desilets of Chicago.

Wiseman, who hails from Newcastle, N. B., and Desilets, former Charlottetown and St. John star, are staging a merry battle for second spot, with 22 points each, four more than Bill Cowley of Boston, who used to do his scoring for Halifax Wolverines. Cowley, in turn, is a single point ahead of teammate Bill Hollett, formerly of North Sydney, N. S., and Hollett is two points up on Ray Gettiffe, Charlottetown and Saint John player of former years.

## Close Race For Scoring Lead Waged In N.H.L.

MONTREAL, Feb. 13—(CP)—The race for individual scoring honors in the National Hockey League has turned into a real dogfight with four leaders battling it out in a bunch for the top spot held almost all season by Chicago's Johnny Gottselig.

Three contenders, the League's weekly statistics show tonight, have moved up into a quadruple tie with the Chicagoan at 32 points apiece. Top Blake of Montreal Canadiens and Sweeney Schriner of New York Americans are right there with Gottselig.

The energetic Blake, whose four-goal performance against Amerks here Thursday was the League's feat-of-the-week, has 15 goals, 13 assists and 28 points. Schriner has 10, his 22 assists giving him leadership in that division.

Top man in goals is also Sibielsky of New York Rangers with 17, two up on Blake and Toronto's Gordie Drillon, who's quickly making up for several games missed through injury.

Another leaf-burly Red Horner is still leading the penalty parade. He has spent 65 minutes in the box for 56 for Rangers, Art Coulter.

Streatham is tied in the league standing in next-last place with Earl Court Rangers. In announcing the team's withdrawal, managing director A. E. Warman said the club was meeting all its financial obligations to players and added that the team might tour the continent before disbanding.

Streatham's roster include: Bobbie Beaton, New Glasgow, N. S., right wing.  
Streatham defied the ban imposed Feb. 8 on three players suspended as a result of their method of protesting against a misconduct penalty meted out to Louis St. Denis in an earlier game. Streatham used the trio the same night, despite the ban, and defeated Brighton Tigers 5-4.

The game was awarded to Brighton and director Warman asked the B. I. H. A. to reconsider the suspensions against the Streatham players. He claimed his club could not have raised a team to play Brighton without these men because six others were out of action due to injuries.

The B. I. H. A. refused to consider his decisions, however, and Streatham's announcement of withdrawal followed. The subject is up for discussion tomorrow by the association council.

The game will start at 7:30 sharp with one hour's skating after the match.

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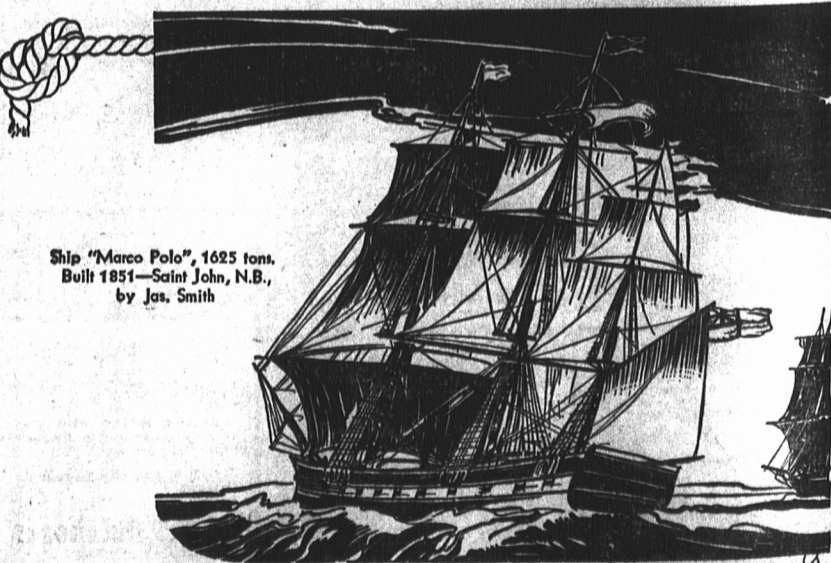

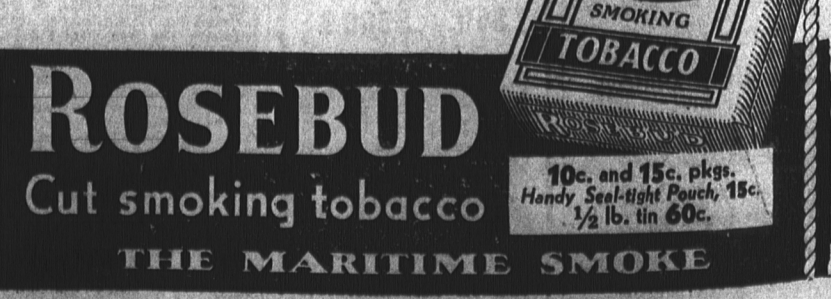
