ANALYSIS OF ESTIMATES IN PARLIAMENT

P. E. I. Appropriation For Harbors And Rivers Reduced By Over \$70,000.

The following analysis of the Parli- amentary estimates is given by the Canadian Press: The total amount which the govern- ment asks Parliament to vote is \$399,358,101, as compared with \$404, 245,140 applied for the current fiscal year. This is a decrease of \$4,887, 039.

A decrease of approximately two and a half millions in the amount required for interest on the public debt is shown in the estimates. The amount appropriated for this purpose during the coming fiscal year is \$119,353,478, or \$2,527,014 less than the requirement for the current fiscal year.

Principal Increases. The principal increases are on ac- count of aviation, public works in- come, pensions and national health, post office, public works capital and marine department capital.

The services showing the largest decreases are interest on public debt, immigration and colonization, soldier and general land settlement, ocean and river service, railways, and canals capital and adjustment of war claims.

The total provided for aviation is \$7,475,700, an increase of \$1,554,537, covering increased training expenses, civil air operations and air mail routes.

Public works income is included at \$25,139,570, an increase of \$2,204,081. The estimate for the Department of Pensions and National Health is \$10,037,500, an increase of \$835,140, mainly for care of patients and medical examination of pensioners and an increased amount for pay and allowances, etc.

The requirements of the post of- fice are set at \$37,336,365, an in- crease of \$2,148,730 mainly for salar- ies and mail service by air.

Railways and Capital. The estimate for railways and canals capital is \$16,279,800, a decrease of \$3,174,943, due to smaller require- ments for the Hudson Bay Railway and the Welland ship canal.

The estimate of the amount re- quired to pay pensions on account of the great war is \$42,000,000. Provision is made under railways and canals capital for a new car fer- ry between Prince Edward Island and the mainland, \$2,500,000; Hud- son Bay Railway and Terminals, \$5, 900,000, and Welland ship canal \$7, 600,000.

The large items under public works capital are for the Confed- eration building \$1,200,000, the National Research Council Laboratories, \$1,800,000; Burlington ship channel improvements, \$1,000,000, and the lower lakes terminal at Prescott, \$3, 100,000.

Public works income includes items for the postal terminal building at Montreal, \$400,000, and Toronto cus- toms house, \$1,500,000.

With regard to public works, Nova Scotia secures an increase over the current fiscal year as far as public buildings are concerned, that prov- ince having \$221,500 worth of con- struction in prospect. This compares with \$189,300 for the year ending March 31, 1930.

Less for New Brunswick. New Brunswick's quota is less than for last year, the figures being \$68, 800, as compared with \$120,500. Con- struction of a new pipe line and re- pairs to the existing line at the Saint John quarantine station, Partridge Island, will take up \$35,000 of this sum.

No allotment appears for Prince Edward Island, under the head of public buildings. In the items under "harbors and rivers" Nova Scotia's application to- tal \$893,700, an increase of \$73,000 over last year.

Island Appropriation Decreased. Prince Edward Island's share un- der this head drops from \$177,800 to \$105,300; while that of New Brun- swick increases from \$444,100 to \$502, 500. A total of \$90,000 will be spent on a breakwater and pier at Casse's Cape, \$38,000 for breakwater exten- sion and dredging at Cape Bauld, \$33,000 for a wharf at Middle Car- quet, and other smaller items for miscellaneous repairs and improve- ments.

This is unfair and it is not fulfilling the requirements of the fair wage clause. Mr. Elliott replied that this was the first intimation that he had had in the nature of a complaint. Mr. Mac- Dougall asked if the Minister of Labor intended carrying out the prom- ise he had made last session to in- troduce legislation which would in- sist upon the fair wage clause being observed in all government con- tracts. A. A. Heaps, Labor, Winnipeg, north, asked if it were correct that men were being paid 25 cents an hour on Government work, when they should be receiving 33 cents.
