THE CAPITAL EXPENDITURE

On Railways, Canals and Military Last Year

Debt Reduced Nearly Seven Millions —Premier Ross and His Temperance Bill—Ministers who Dissent.

DOMINION CAPITAL ACCOUNT.
OTTAWA, March 17—(Special)—The Public Accounts presented to-day to Parliament by Hon. Mr. Fielding show the expenditure on the Intercolonial for the year ending June 30 last, chargeable to capital was \$2,251,266; on the Prince Edward Island road \$229,414; Canals \$4,000,954; Public Works \$1,268,004; Militia \$428,223 and on Dominion Lands \$49,542.

BOUNTIES AND MILITARY.
The sum of \$1,408,252 was paid on account of bounties on iron and steel and \$130,400 in connection with South African Contingents and Halifax garrison.

REDUCTION OF DEBT.
The reduction in the net debt resulting from the ordinary business of the year was \$6,914,12,601.

A MODIFIED TEMPERANCE BILL.
TORONTO, March 17—(Special)—The better elements of the Reformers supported by the temperance party will request Premier Ross to go to the country on a modified temperance bill.

SOME OPPOSING ELEMENTS.
The ministers who are expected to dissent from the measure are Stratton, Gibson and Harcourt.

ESTIMATES PRESENTED.
OTTAWA, March 17.—Estimates for the year ending June 30, 1903 were presented to Parliament yesterday by Hon. Mr. Fielding, Minister of Finance.

THE GRAND TOTAL.
The total estimated expenditure on Consolidated Fund and Capital account is \$62,965,338, a decrease over the estimate for 1903-1904 of \$5,456,563 but the supplementary estimates are likely to make this up.

FOR P. E. ISLAND.
The expenditures for Prince Edward Island include the following:
Charlottetown Dominion building improvements, additions, etc., \$ 5,000.
Higgins Shore Pier works of reconstruction and repairs, \$100,000.
New London repairs to breakwater etc., \$5,500.

New London Harbor improvements at entrance to channel to Clifton and French Rivers, \$5,500; North Cardigan Pier extension \$2,000; Point Prim Island Wharf, \$5,000.

Repairs to Piers and breakwaters \$8,000.
Repairs to piers and breakwater cross-tied timber, \$5,000.
Richmond Bay reconstruction of wharf near Grand Ferry, \$5,000.

Rustico Harbor breakwater on Robinson's Island south side of entrance to harbor, \$11,000.
West Point Wharf repairs \$1,000.
