Church Union At Mulgrave

MULGRAVE, Feb. 24.—St. Matthew's Presbyterian Church completed voting last night and gave a majority of six against entering the United Church of Canada.

This church was opened on May 14, 1894, under the pastorate of Rev. Mr. Munro, and has been classed as a mission station receiving support from the mission funds until the allowance was cancelled two years ago. Since that time the small congregation has supported its own student minister.

It has been always classed as one of the most liberal congregations in its subscriptions to missions, and Forward Movement. In the latter case it was asked to contribute \$100 while the nice sum of over \$500 was subscribed and paid.

St. Matthews will still continue to hold service at intervals with the co-operation and support of the Presbyterian Church Association. The very best of goodwill prevails between Methodists and Presbyterians.

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Feb. 24.—(EGGS)—Seven cars of United States fresh eggs are reported to have arrived in Montreal this week. These for the most part grade seconds and will cost from 35 to 37 delivered. 2,000 cases of storage eggs that were exported on consignment to Great Britain have been brought back by the shipper owing to the serious decline in the British market. Toronto and Montreal unchanged. Winnipeg jobbing extras 55, firsts 50, seconds 35. Alberta jobbing prices extras 45 to 50, firsts 40 to 48, Vancouver jobbing extras 36, firsts 34, seconds 33.

MONTREAL, Feb. 24.—The export business in Canadian grain was again inactive here today. A fair number of cables were received by exporters asking for offers of all lines of grain and one or two firm bids were made for No. 1, No. 2 and No. 3 Northern which exporters stated were 2.5c. d. per quarter below working basis. There was some demand for oats in the local cash grain market and sales of No. 2 Canadian Western were made at 5 cents per bushel over the Winnipeg May option and No. 2 feed grade at 7 cents per bushel over the one at 7 cents per bushel under the same option c.i.f. bay ports, but apart from this the trade was quiet. The market for spring wheat flour was without any new feature to note. The trade in winter wheat flour was also reported slow. The undertone to the milled market was easy at the present decline in prices noted. The market for rolled oats was quiet and prices were unchanged. There was no further developments in the egg situation, prices being about steady at the recent declines noted. The butter trade was featured by the continued steady demand for supplies for shipment to Germany. Little business was transacted in cheese and the tone was firm with tender made No. 1 white and colored goods quoted at 20 to 14 to 20 1/2 cents per pound and No. 2 grade at 19 to 14 to 19 1/2 cents per pound. Beans were steady at \$2.70 per bushel.

Wembley Shortage

LONDON, Feb. 24.—The financial results of the 1924 Empire Exhibition are outlined in an official memorandum just issued showing that at the close of the exhibition last year, the expenditure stood at £3,500,000. Lloyd's Bank advanced to the exhibition authorities £1,800,000, while there is also a liability of 150,000 for the balance of the entertainments duty on admission to the exhibition.

The exhibition guarantee totals £1,207,000 including £100,000 from the government, which has agreed that a bill should be submitted to parliament raising the expenditure guarantee providing that the exhibition board secure sufficient support from the dominions, colonies and exhibitions to secure a satisfactory exhibition this year.

Lady Astor Ordered To Take Vacation

PLYMOUTH, Eng., Feb. 24.—Lady Astor, M. P., has been ordered to the country for two or three weeks' rest and her children are ordered to take a vacation. She is commanded by her physician to seek quietude for a short time.

Snowden Causes Flurry In Commons

LONDON, Feb. 24.—Considerable excitement arose in Commons over the British Government's proposed contributions to the assistance of Northern Ireland. Former chairman of exchequer Snowden accused the Belfast Government of illegally extracting money from the British treasury in a manner, which he said, parliamentary language would not permit him to describe. He said in Ulster there was a political party for every 5 families. The item under discussion was for a million and quarter pounds to pay for Ulster special constabulary.

South Africa And Australia Tackle Shipping Problems

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Feb. 24.—South Africa and Australia, as well as Canada are struggling with shipping problems. Thomas Boyd Lell, South African Minister of Posts and Telegraph said yesterday. The Canadian shipping agreement tackled the same problem that had been facing South Africa.

Australia is putting up the Commonwealth Line of passenger and freight steamers for sale but it is by no means certain that the Commonwealth parliament will agree to any bargain that the government recommends. The conditions of sale would be to purchasers maintain regular service between Australia, Great Britain and Europe, that there be no increase in fares or freights and that no arrangement be made with any shipping combine. These conditions seem to make it impossible for any British purchaser. Foreign companies employing foreign crews at low wages are the most probable purchasers.

5,000 Americans Cheer Britisher

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—Five thousand persons stood for several minutes and cheered today at the George Washington celebration when the British Ambassador, Sir Esme Howard, was presenting a prize to a young woman for an essay on an incident of the American Revolution. They applauded with such enthusiasm that the Ambassador had difficulty in proceeding. One of those present was Secretary of State Hughes. The Ambassador said the men who led the American Revolution "were but following in the steps of the barons of Runnymede, of Pym and Hampden and Cromwell and they were as you have properly noted, supported by the best intellects of the time."

Campaign of Crime In Ireland Scored

BELFAST, Feb. 24.—Alluding to the distress under which a section of the Irish people is suffering Bishop Fogarty of Killaloe, in the course of a pastoral, says this distress might be in consequence of Ireland's own sins.

"During the great war, heaven spread a mantle of protection over Ireland, while the rest of Europe was undergoing dreadful carnage," the Bishop writes. "While other were starving, God bled abundance upon the Irish people, and we have shown our gratitude by burning, wrecking and destroying the gifts of God in a campaign of crime which is an awful scandal to the world and a disgrace to the Irish name. Now if His chastening hand is laid on us we have nobody to blame but ourselves."

C.N.R. Radio Costs

OTTAWA, Feb. 24.—The two radio stations installed by the Canadian National Railways at Ottawa and Montreal cost \$18,253 and \$22,500, respectively, according to answers made by the Railway Department to questions of George Black, Conservative, in the House of Commons today. Twenty passenger cars have been equipped with wireless for a total cost of \$10,943.39, averaging \$547.17 per car. The equipment in the cars is according to statement, "to afford information and entertainment for passengers and thereby attract passenger business to Canadian National lines."
