Important Decision by Judge Inman

The County Court resumed its sitting at Summerside on Tuesday, Jan. 15th. His Honour Judge Inman presided. The first case to be dealt with was the appeal case of J. Robert MacDonald against Edward Perry, which had been adjourned for judgment dealing with the important points at issue in this case. The defendant had been charged before the Stipendiary Magistrate Wyatt with having liquor in his possession contrary to the provisions of the Prohibition Act. The Stipendiary Magistrate had dismissed the charge on the grounds that Inspector Keir Mann had no legal right to make a search in question, and that therefore the evidence so obtained was inadmissible against the accused, as laid down by the late Judge MacQuarrie in the case of Samuel Graham, Jr. From this dismissal the Prosecutor appealed to the County Court, and a report of the evidence taken on the hearing of the Appeal has previously been published in the Guardian. Judge Inman, after an exhaustive view of the authorities, held that the appellant was entitled to succeed on two grounds: (a) The evidence given by Keir Mann disclosing facts and circumstances which clearly justified Mann in searching Respondent's person under the Provisions of Section 130 of the Prohibition Act. (b) Even if the search had been shown to be illegal, this would not affect the admissibility in the evidence of the facts as discovered. His Honour therefore allowed the Appeal and reversed the decision of the Stipendiary Magistrate. He found the Respondent guilty of the offence charged and inflicted a fine of \$300 and costs of three months in jail. Mr. Thane A. Campbell appeared as Counsel for the Appellant. This is a very important decision as it clears up two difficult points, which a great many prohibition prosecutions have previously failed. The Late Mr. Jas. MacDonald

The death occurred yesterday morning in the Prince Edward Island Hospital of Mr. James MacDonald, one of Charlottetown's best known and most esteemed citizens. Mr. MacDonald, who had reached the advanced age of ninety-three years, had been in excellent health until a week ago when he was seized with illness and removed to the hospital. His passing removes one of the few remaining landmarks of the early days of the Province. He was born in Strathabane, and after teaching school in different parts of the Island for a number of years, came to Charlottetown where he was appointed to a position in the Customs, from which he retired about fifteen years ago on superannuation, after long and faithful service. Mr. MacDonald was known through out Prince Edward Island as the father of the Charlottetown Water System. Some years before it was established he began to advocate it enthusiastically through the press and on the platform. In February, 1912, he was elected a member of the Board of Water Commissioners and served continuously being re-elected several times by acclamation until his retirement in 1924. During his term of office, the sewerage system was established in Charlottetown. The late Mr. MacDonald was a man of commanding physique and most distinguished appearance. He possessed literary ability of a high order and was a graceful and concise writer, in Gaelic as well as English. By his genial manner and fine qualities of mind and heart he made many friends in city and country. He leaves to mourn one son Charles S. MacDonald of Port Wood in the Belfast district, one daughter, Mrs. (Capt.) McEachern in Springvale, Maine. His wife predeceased him by some years. The body will be taken to the MacLean Funeral Parlors, and the funeral will be held from St. Paul's Church of which he was a member.

IMPORTATION OF GOATS—What is said to be the first importation of pure bred Nubian milk goats to P. E. Island arrived by express at Summerside on Monday, consigned to Mr. Lowell Hancock, well known to local fox rancher. The consignment consisted of one young buck and two three-year-old does, all registered in the International Nubian Breeders' Association, whose headquarters are in California. They were selected by Mr. Hancock during his recent visit to New York State at their home in the Adirondacks from the Northern Head of pure bred Nubians, the largest and choicest herd of Nubians in the United States. The owner will make tests this spring in raising fox pups on this goat milk and also hopes to build up a herd to supply other fox ranchers with breeding stock. 8
