H.M.S. DOMINION TO VISIT THIS PORT

Rumor That Trip to Charlottetown Would Be Abandoned Has No Foundation--Lieut. Governor MacKinnon Has Received Word That Ship Will Arrive Sunday.

The rumor, which was circulated yesterday afternoon that H. M. S. Dominion would not visit Charlottetown, turns out to be without foundation. The Guardian is informed through the courtesy of Lieutenant Governor MacKinnon that His Majesty's battleship Dominion will arrive in this port on Sunday next, the 12th inst. His Honor was in communication with the captain of the Dominion yesterday,

and received from him a message last night to the above effect. The news will be received with gladness by the people of this Province, and His Honor kind offices in the matter should be duly appreciated. The arrival of the Dominion in this port will afford citizens an opportunity to see what one of Great Britain's first class battleships is like. That the ship's arrival will be eagerly looked for goes without saying.

FOREST FIRES IN THE SOO DISTRICT

SALT STE. MARIE, Ont., Aug. 6.--Dense clouds of smoke are arising from forest fires on both sides of the river. The sun was almost totally obscured during the latter part of yesterday by smoke on the Michigan side. Heavy smoke hangs over the Algoma district on this side of the river, where many camps are located. Lumbermen fear the loss will be heavy. The ground is parched from lack of rain.

CAN LEARN MUCH FROM CANADA

TORONTO, Aug. 6.--Yes, we have a great deal to learn from Canada in regard to Canadian cheese as one of the finest in the world, where the statements of Dr. C. Van Ellbrecht, of Copenhagen, Denmark. Dr. Ellbrecht is dairy commissioner of the Danish government, and for the last year and a half has been studying the dairy methods of the new world in Canada and the United States. "Canada, Australia and Ireland are our greatest competitors in the world's dairy markets," he remarked. "Regarding butter, I think we supply about 45 per cent. of the English market. You see we are always in touch with that market. We have men there who study English tastes and just as soon as Englishmen's taste changes the dairymen in Denmark know all about it."

MOROCCO AFFAIR IS CRITICAL

LONDON, Aug. 6.--A despatch to the Pall Mall Gazette from Tangier published this afternoon says: "Highly sensational reports are being received here, causing the utmost excitement. Daily, almost hourly, comes information from the interior of the rapid spread of a violent anti-French agitation. The rebels are concentrating their military contingents around Marakesh (Morocco City) the southern capital, and there is no doubt that a formidable coalition of semi-independent vassals has been formed. They are clamoring for a holy war and urging the Viceroys, Prince Abdul Hafid, to proclaim himself Sultan. The situation is more critical than it has been for thirty years."

QUITE OPPOSED TO ALL DIVORCE

BUFFALO, N. B., Aug. 6.--The American Federation of Catholic organizations have passed a resolution on divorce. The resolution states that Catholic delegates are opposed to all forms of absolute divorce. It favors a limited divorce or separation in extreme cases, expresses the duty of Catholics to try to educate those without the church to the doctrine that under no circumstances should parties to a lawful marriage be allowed to re-marry within the lifetime of either; expresses gratification with signs of an aroused sentiment upon the subject; calls for an encouraging sign the convening of a divorce congress to consider divorce legislation; commends the efforts of the legislature and governor of Pennsylvania at whose instance the congress was held; of the president of the United States, whose message to congress on the subject had such far-reaching effect and of the divorce congress itself for its enlightened efforts to bring about reform so greatly needed.

WORKMEN'S COUNCIL WILL CALL OFF RUSSIAN STRIKE

Provinces Are Expected to Follow St Petersburg's Lead--Time Was Inopportune, Railway Men Refused to Join and Peasants Made No Move--Revolutionary Leaders Suffer Serious Loss of Prestige in Consequence

St. PETERSBURG, Aug. 7--(Special)--The Workmen's Council has decided to call off the strike in St. Petersburg and the announcement will be issued tonight or tomorrow. This action does not apply to the provinces, but there is little doubt that workmen there will follow St. Petersburg's example.

Many trades unions lately refused to join in the movement, but favor a renewal of the strike in the autumn. The railroad men whose co-operation was vital could not be induced to give the signal for a strike and there was no sign of a serious peasant movement. While the repressions and arrests of leaders undoubtedly were a great factor

in bringing about the present situation it is apparent that the moment was ill chosen for a strike. The people were not in a temper to support it. As a consequence the revolutionary leaders who inspired it with the intention of transferring the movement into an armed uprising have suffered a severe loss of prestige.

TWO DROWNED IN NEW BRUNSWICK

One Falls Overboard, Another by Boat Overturning in Lake

St. JOHN, Aug. 7--(Special)--George Pike of St. John, a deck hand on the steamer Victoria, fell overboard while the boat was landing at Fredericton this evening and sank instantly. His body was not recovered. He was aged forty, and leaves a wife and family. Fred Newton, an Englishman employed as a mill hand at Woodstock Lake near here was drowned today by the overturning of his boat.

KING AND POWER ARRESTED IN C B

On Arrival of S S Garibaldi In Which they Escaped from Charlottetown

Word was received by the Police Department last night that James King and Frank Power who are wanted for taking part in the attack upon Police Sergeant Taylor on Sunday morning last had been arrested at Port Morien, C. B. These two men it now turns out went on board the S S Garibaldi Monday afternoon about 5 o'clock just before she sailed from this port. It is believed they secreted themselves on the ship. The police, however, suspected that they had escaped in this manner, and finding that Port Morien was the Garibaldi's destination, they telegraphed to the authorities there to search the ship on arrival and arrest the men if found on board. A telegram was received from the Chief of Police there last night saying that both men were under arrest and would be held till sent for. Either Marshal Cameron or Detective Bradley, and probably another policeman, will leave this morning and be expected back tomorrow or Friday night with the prisoners. The Garibaldi is a freight steamer, which has been employed all summer carrying coal from the mines at Port Morien, C. B. to the Railway yard at Charlottetown.

ANOTHER BANK MERGER EXPECTED

FREDERICTON, N. B., Aug. 7--(Special)--The directors of the Peoples Bank of Fredericton refuse to discuss the reported merger with the Royal Bank of Canada. Word from Montreal today said a definite offer had been made, and would probably be accepted but local men refuse to admit or deny this. The impression is that the merger will take place very soon.

BRAVE DEED OF CHARLOTTETONIAN

NORTH SYDNEY, Aug. 6--By the promptness and daring of Hugh McCarron, of the schooner Kohinor, of Charlottetown, an unknown man was saved from drowning in the harbor Tuesday night. About 11.30 o'clock Mr. McCarron was awakened by shouts coming from some person in distress. Hastily rushing on deck, McCarron listened for a repetition of the cries. Fully three hundred yards away he descried a man struggling in the water. Being an excellent swimmer, McCarron jumped overboard and swam to the rescue. Just as the unknown was going down, McCarron, who is an excellent specimen of physical manhood, grasped the exhausted man and conveyed him to the deck of the Kohinor. It was a noble act on the part of McCarron, whose modesty would not allow him to speak on the matter.

HEAT KILLS IN NEW YORK CITY

NEW YORK, Aug. 6--Upwards of twenty persons died in this city today as a result of the heat. There were scores of prostrations and the suffering among the poor was intense. Tonight conditions are somewhat better, but thousands of persons had died from the city, driven away by the excessive humidity and a temperature which the government thermometer showed to be the record for 1906. The weather bureau mercury shot up to 93 for its highest point this afternoon, but it was much hotter on street levels, some thermometers showing 102.

MONCTON IS DRY MAY BE DRIER

As Result of Police Magistrate Kay's Decision To Imprison Scott Act Violators Without the Option of Fine--Saloon Keepers Await Decision of Higher Court

MONCTON, Aug. 7--(Special)--This recent innovation made by Police Magistrate Kay in Scott Act enforcement has had the effect of curtailing the prevalent drunkenness to a considerable extent. For the first time in recent years the whole week has passed with scarcely an arrest for inebriation.

If the courts sustain the decision given by the Police Magistrate, Moncton will probably be the driest town in Canada within a short time. A number of saloon keepers are only waiting the decision of the higher court, as to whether they can be imprisoned without the option of a fine before deciding to go out of the liquor business.

WAS SUMMERSIDE MAN DRUGGED

MONCTON Aug 7--The Moncton Times says three arrests were made by the police about seven o'clock last evening. The patrol wagon was called in use to convey the prisoner to the lockup. They were found lying in an intoxicated state on the marsh near the M. A. A. grounds. They had from Summerside and one of them evidently had been under the influence of a drug. When he came to his senses he asked where he was and on being informed he said to get officer Phillips and he would soon release him from the difficulty. He was questioned as to who officer Phillips was and replied that he was a member of the Summerside police force. He was acquainted with the fact that he was not in Summerside but in Moncton. He said he did not know how he got here; he did not remember ever boarding a boat or train and he was in Summerside on Saturday morning. He said he did not know a thing that had happened since Saturday morning and could not account for his presence in Moncton. He was informed as to the day of the week. He made considerable trouble for the officers but his arrest was the work of but a few minutes. The other prisoners gave no trouble. The prisoner referred to was well dressed and appeared rather bright.

HEIR TO RICHES ENLISTS IN NAVY

NEWPORT, R. I., August 6.--James Rayner Wells, son of William Storrs Wells, a New York millionaire who owns Chetwode, one of the most attractive villas in Bellevue avenue, has enlisted in the navy. His enlistment was evidently made with the full sanction of his father, who was at the train to bid him goodbye this afternoon, when he left with a detachment of blue jackets for the receiving ship Franklin, at Norfolk.

YOUNGSTER TAKES A LONG TRIP

LONDON, August 6--The youngest ever travelling in the world, and the youngest snow-shoe champion, has just arrived in London from New York. His name is Charles Clinton Gladwin, of New York, and he is two years and eight months old.

He boarded the Celtic at New York and did not cry once during the whole voyage. He was attracted in a red jockey cap and "swagger" red overcoat, and day promading on deck with his hands in his pockets, as self-possessed as any one on board.

On a label attached to his buttonhol was the inscription: Charles Clinton Gladwin Jr., of New York. Bound for London, England. To be forwarded to Mrs. E. Barr, 40, Priory-road, Chiswick, London, England.
