HOLD SERVICES IN SCHOOLS - Special Armistice services were held yesterday in city schools. Prince of Wales College and St. Dunstan's University. Addresses were given on "the spirit of armistice" on behalf of the Charlottetown branch of the Canadian Legion, B. E. S. L. Speakers included Major W. J. MacDonald, Notre Dame academy; Major F. Tierney, Rochford Square School; Captain James Leightner, Queen Square School; Lt. Col. R. C. Chandler, West Kent School; Captain Norman Lowther, Prince Street School; Prof. Howard Clark, Prince of Wales College; and Rev. Father MacKenzie, St. Dunstan's University.

NARROW ESCAPE - A narrow escape occurred at Pinette Bridge on Nov. 4th, when a dory in which Vernon Moore and Murdoch Kilmore were working beneath the bridge, capsized. When Gilmore, who could not swim, came to the surface, he found the boat was under the water, and had it not been for Moore who was a strong swimmer, he would not have been able to free himself. After waiting for a short time for his partner to come up, Moore began to swim around the boat, and finally got hold of him, pulling him from under the overturned craft and swimming with him and the boat to the shore, against a very strong current and a strong wind. Mr. Gilmore as well as those who witnessed the accident are proud of their praiseworthy actions, and as this is not the first life he has saved, such efforts should not be allowed to pass unnoticed.

A resolution requesting Superintendent Magistrate K. M. Martin, K. C., to dismiss Sergeant Dominic Doyle for conduct "unbecoming to a police officer," was defeated by a vote of five to three at the regular monthly meeting of the Charlottetown City Council last night. Those voting for the motion were Councillors McIntyre, chairman of the police committee, Foster and Laporne. Those voting against, Councillors Hennessey, McLeod, Chandler, Dougan and VanDerstine. Under section 129 of the City by-laws disciplining and dismissal of all members of the police force is vested in the Superintendent Magistrate. It had been customary in all cases of sufficient public interest for the Magistrate to give consideration to a report from the Council, the meeting was held. Following defeat of the resolution His Worship Mayor P. W. Turner announced that the matter would be dealt with by the Superintendent Magistrate, and a report made by the police committee at the next meeting. The Council accepted an offer by the property owners involved to convey to the City land necessary to extend Brighton Place from York Lane to Admiral Street.

Senator Creelman MacArthur has narrowly escaped Tuesday night when his new Terraplane car went over the side of a bridge about half a mile east of Richmond. The Senator was driving back to town from a visit to his summer cottage at Foxley River. His car had just come off the gravel road and struck some greasy mud, causing it to skid over to one side of the bridge, smashing through the railing and turned over into the brook below. A man near by heard the crash and hastened to the scene, and succeeded in extricating Mr. MacArthur from his perilous position, pinned between the steering wheel and the seat. The Senator was in a dazed or semi-conscious condition, but it happily developed that he suffered no serious injury and he was able to return home some hours later, apparently none the worse physically for his experience, but his beautiful 1937 Terraplane, is badly demolished.
