Hoot Evers Slams Out 5 Hits To Lead Tigers To 9-5 Win Over Yankees

(By The Canadian Press)
 Outfielder Hoot Evers yesterday (Thursday) slammed out five hits to lead Detroit Tigers to their third straight victory over New York Yankees, 9-5. The victory cut the Yankees' lead over the second-place Tigers to 3½ games in the American League.

St. Louis Browns, after losing 11 straight, racked up their fourth straight victory with an 11-0 shut-out over Boston Red Sox.

It was Boston's third successive loss to the Browns, and the Browns' first shutout victory of the season. It was Dick Starr's first victory, a six-hit performance, after seven losses.

Philadelphia Athletics converted a walk, Luke Appling's two-base throwing error, and an infield roller into a 12-inning run to beat Chicago White Sox 1-0.

The triumph gave Philadelphia a clean sweep of the three-game series.

IN THE CORNER

Sports writers have had about a week to digest the news of the new 70-game schedule for the National Hockey League next season, and reaction to the 10-game increase seems varied. For example, Dan (Kitchener Waterloo Record) Odette figures the added contests won't benefit anyone except the team owners. "The players will probably get more money, but they'll burn themselves out much faster doing it," states Odette.

He doesn't think the move will improve the standard of N.H.L. play, either, because the puck-chasers won't get proper rest between games and won't be able to give his best at all times. "I'm getting together every year. I used to get a lot of fun out of hockey, but now I have to be serious all the time, and old Mr. Injury is right there to meet you every time you get near the boards because of the style of hockey being played today. And how can anybody expect to play our best when we are fagged from one game to another?"

On the other hand, Doug (Windsor Star) Vaughan, questioning players about the longer schedule, found that "while many hockeyists figured that 70 games were too many to maintain peak condition, they liked the increased pay cheques that are bound to come their way." As for the extra wear and tear on the players, Vaughan notes that "The number of players a team can dress for a game has been increased from 18 to 17, excluding the goalie, and the League governors feel that it won't be too great a strain for the teams to play an extra 10 games."

Workers were busily engaged at Memorial Field yesterday in the repairing and renovating of a single story building, which had originally been moved over to the north-east corner of the grounds on Brighton Road last year and was situated at the north-west corner of the field. The building, however, has been moved back to its original position and the backstop, where it is being fitted up for use as a combination canteen, dressing room and store room. The project is being carried out under the direction of the Department of Physical Fitness.

The work was progressing rapidly during yesterday, with a new floor having already been laid, and sundry minor repairs done to the exterior. Considerable other work still remains to be done, including the partitioning off of the three sections of the building, etc.

The canteen, which will be set up, will be for the purpose of serving the public at ball games and other events held there, and will be operated by the caretaker in charge of the Memorial Field. The store room space will be utilized for keeping the various items of equipment necessary to keep the track, diamonds, etc. in first class shape, while the dressing room will be used mainly for the benefit of visiting ball teams, track and field athletes, etc.

The regular scheduled game in the Island Baseball League which was slated for Summerside on Wednesday night between Curran and Briggs and the Summerside Capitals, was postponed on account of rain, it was learned yesterday, and although no definite date has been set as yet for playing this game, it is hoped to go forward on Tuesday, weather permitting.

Abergvilt team officials announced yesterday that they will travel by special bus to Summerside on Sunday where they will meet the R.C.A.F. in a regular Island League fixture in the afternoon. The bus will leave the bus stop at 12.30, after officials stated that there will be a limited number of seats available for local fans who wish to make the trip. Those wishing accommodation on the bus are asked to contact officials in advance so that reservations can be made without any mix-up or delays.
