**RENFREW FIRE.**—On account of the wrong impression created by newspaper notices of the fire in the Plant of the Renfrew Machinery Co., Ltd., Renfrew, Ont., the Guardian is asked to announce that it was the Shell Plant only that was destroyed. **AIRIED THE NEW BAGPIPES.**—The N.C.O.'s and men of B. Company, 105th Battalion gave their new set of bagpipes its first airing yesterday afternoon when, headed by their piper, Pte. Neil McDonald, they paraded to the King Edward Hotel, where they enjoyed a supper put up in the most enticing style of the well known hostelry. After supper Pte. McDonald rendered a fine selection of Scottish music, thoroughly trying out the pipes, which all declared to be a magnificent instrument. The pipes were purchased by the members of B. Company, who subscribed the necessary amount and had enough remaining to put up the supper enjoyed. The Company with its piper presented a fine appearance and attracted much attention and many complimentary comments.

**ORGANIZATION OF CADET CORPS.**—Capt. R. Robinson Black, the newly appointed Organizer and Inspector of Cadet Corps in the Maritime Provinces, left on Monday for the mainland after paying his first visit to the Cadet Corps of the province. Because of the development of "esprit de corps" among the cadets, there will doubtless be the keenest competition for the award of the premier position among the Island units as a result of the annual inspections to take place in May and June.

Property Committee. He had enquired of Messrs Newbery and Paton, the Committee in charge of the gardens, and they inferred that it was not their intention to engage a gardener this year, but to have the work done by the present assistant, Mr. McKenna. The City Council was given a year's grant of \$350 for the upkeep of the gardens and he considered the Council should be represented on the Committee and have a voice in the expenditure of the money. The citizens did not want to see the gardens neglected, but if they contributed to their maintenance they had a right to a voice in the appointment of a gardener and to know how the money was being expended. Councillors Wright and Smith concurred in these remarks, the latter stating that he would oppose a continuation of the grant until the Council
