The Railway men are now beginning to meet with trouble from ice on the rails. Yesterday afternoon when the new plough in charge of Conductor Hibbett started for the Junction the front trucks were derailed near the C. A. A. grounds but it only required half an hour to place them on again.

Dr. Borden has lately received applications from two more young ladies, who desire to attend the Ladies' College. This makes the total number of the residents students 145, thus taxing the buildings to their utmost capacity. Another addition to the Ladies' College is now a burning question. The teachers of Oratory and Household Science are obliged to work over time in order to attend to the large number of students in their classes. Fifty from the Ladies' College and forty-five from the town are taking Household Science—Sackville Tribune Miss Amy Carver, Pownal is teacher of Oratory.

The death occurred on January 29th, a Little River, Lot 36, of Alfred A. McKie, 27, eldest son of Edwin G. and Mrs. McKie, leaving to mourn a father and mother, five brothers, two sisters, and a large circle of friends. The deceased who was of a light hearted and buoyant disposition bore an illness of over a month's duration with true Christian forbearance. About four years ago he left for Portage La Prairie and subsequently to Oak Lake in the Canadian west. Early last autumn, ill health obliged him to return to his Island home, in hope that his native air would prove beneficial. He was a member of Oak Lake Lodge No. 11 A. F. and A. M., also of the Knights of Pythias and the C. O. F. His remains were interred in Annandale Cemetery. (Examiner please copy.)

The Winnipeg Telegram says: Canadian exports to Japan have received a stimulus since the abandonment of the Russian fleet in the eastern waters. Every steamer for the Orient is now carrying large cargoes of Canadian goods, and there is a marked improvement in the exportation of Canadian flour. Butter from the Northwest is also going to Japan in considerable quantities. The Empress of Japan, which sailed from Vancouver a few days ago for Hong Kong via Yokohama, had 1,000 sacks of Canadian flour consigned to Japanese ports, and it is anticipated that the future shipments will be heavy. On the same steamer was about a ton of butter from Calgary for the Japanese. An interesting portion of the cargo was a ton and a quarter of silver bullion from the smelter at Trail, B. C. which was consigned to Shanghai and which will be converted into currency.

The miles of complete electric railway in Canada in 1904 were 707, compared with 739 in 1903. The capital paid, which includes Dominion, Provincial and Municipal bonuses was \$50,389,188, as against \$47,274,538. There were gross earnings of \$8,453,000, compared with \$7,233,077 for the year previous. The working expenses were \$4,472,358 having net earnings of \$2,780,642, compared with 153,002,912 in 1903, an increase of 26,027,181. The freight carried was 409,101 tons an increase of 28,855 tons. There were nine passengers killed in 1904, as against 10 in 1903. The passenger motor cars were 2167, compared with 2027 in 1903. The passenger trailer cars were 223, as against 259 in 1903. The mileage of steam railways on 1st July last was 19,011 miles, an increase of 531 miles over the preceding year. The paid up capital, including Dominion, Provincial and Municipal subsidies was \$1,182,361,918 an increase of almost forty millions. Gross earnings were \$1,000,214,436, an increase of \$4,154,000; working expenditures, \$74,563,102, an increase of \$7,081,038. This left the net earnings \$25,650,274 a decrease of \$2,029,720. The returns show 23,610,735 passengers carried, an increase of 1,692,923 and freight 48,697,319 tons, an increase of 721,022 tons. Twenty-five passengers were killed as compared with 31 the preceding twelve months.
