Montreal Exchange

MONTREAL, April 20 (CP)—The majority of issues to post sales on the stock market Saturday crept steadily along without much change in price.

The metal group, in which the greater part of the activity was centered, showed unchanged prices for Nickel and Hollinger while Hudson Bay lost 1-2 and Builo gained 1-4.

The handful of other issues that dotted the list were Montreal Power, Associated Breweries, Doco, Imperial Oil, Algoma and Asbestos, all of which held to their previous levels. Bell Telephone lost a point and C.P.R. dipped the minimum amount while Imperial Tobacco issues chalked up additions of 1-4 point each.

Total sales: 6,800 shares; Investors 3,200; Mines 3,700; Bonds \$500.

Toronto Exchange

TORONTO, April 20 (CP)—A mild display of weakness in the first hour or two was rectified in the final hour on Saturday on the Toronto stock exchange. Volume duplicated the low for the year at 47,000 shares.

Simmons pfd weakened 1 7-8 to 92 1-4 and B.A. Oil and Canadian Wineries weakened 1-4. Gains in the Industrials involved Distillers-Seagrams, Laura Secord, Massey-Harris pfd, Moore Corporation and Tamblins.

East Malartic recovered to 247 for a net gain of 7 cents. Kerr-Addison closed 6 cents up at 470 and a gain of 3 cents were netted by Preston. Minor losses were showing finally for Brouhan, Canadian Malartic, Upper Canada and Wright-Hargreaves.

Nickel firmed 1-8 and Hudson Bay was down 1-2 for broken lots. Losses of fractions to a cent came out in the western oil group for Commonwealth Petroleum, Davies and East Crest and Home Oil closed 2 down at 1.63. Anglo-Canadian was off 4 to 86 for broken lots.

Currencies

NEW YORK, April 20 (CP)—The Canadian dollar lost 1-16 of cent in relationship to the United States dollar in foreign exchange trading Saturday to close at a discount of 11 13-16 per cent. Ottawa Foreign Exchange Control Board rate 9.09-9.91 per cent discount.

The pound Sterling gained 1-2 cent to \$4.01 1-2.

Last Tuesday the Canadian unit established a 1941 high with a rate of 88.75 U.S. cents and, gradually declining, closed the week at 88.18 3-4 cents. On the same day the pound struck a new 1941 low at \$4.02 and the next day dropped still lower to \$4.00 3-4.

The Hong Kong and Shanghai dollars showed a slight decline for the week and the Argentine free peso was up somewhat.

How To Control Wild Mustard

(Experimental Farms News)

Many grain fields are so infested with mustard that one would almost think it had been seeded deliberately. Every farmer knows that wild mustard has no commercial value. It is just a weed which has been allowed to have too much of its own way all across Canada.

Why allow this useless plant to grow so freely when it can be effectively controlled? asks George Knowles, Field Husbandry Division, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa.

If the consequences of allowing mustard to reproduce itself freely were more generally known, a more determined effort would be made to wipe out this invader.

The reduction in the yield of oats due to mustard has been determined by the Field Husbandry Division on the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, for the past seven years. The figures show that the average loss of oats due to a heavy infestation of mustard is 7.5 bushels per acre or 13.9 per cent of the crop. Consider also the depreciation in the value of a farm due to mustard. No one can accurately determine the amount of this loss but certainly many prospective purchasers reject farms be-

NEW YORK, April 20 (AP)—Stock prices generally softened again Saturday as the market edged out of another declining week with persistent apprehension over war developments.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was off 1 of a point at 39.1, lowest level for this composite since June 11 when the French collapse hit prices. In 13 consecutive sessions the market was able to edge up only once, and that by 1 of a point last Monday.

Transfers for the two hours amounted to 230,110 shares with 290,390 the previous Saturday.

Bombed Stores Take New Grip In Welsh Town

WELSH RAPERS REFLECT DETERMINATION OF PEOPLE TO CARRY ON DESPITE SERIES OF HEAVY RAIDS

SWANSEA, April 19.—(My mail CP)—A city's record of rehabilitation after bombing is written in the columns of its daily newspaper.

German bombers struck savagely at Swansea on three successive nights in March. Ruined houses and stores were evidence enough of this, but even without them it was possible to visualize the extent of the attacks simply by studying the papers. Advertisements and news stories with tell-tale phrases appeared in every edition. Behind them was a story of bombing and fire of damaged premises and stock, and of determination to carry on, despite odds.

Union Jacks and "Business as Usual" signs appeared on every street. "Through Blast and Blitz we carry on," a bakery poster said, while a hardware store boasted: "We had no windows but plenty of stock."

Businesses that were bombed-out carried on at new sites and notices overlooking Swansea's lower-town, sons of better-class families played soccer. Girls in smart tunics enjoyed a game of field hockey. Swansea was still carrying on, for even bombs could not keep the men and women from work or the children from play.

Late at night a group of soldiers and their sweethearts passed under the hotel window, singing a popular song of the day. When they finished someone took up the refrain of the "Men of Harlech" and the strains of this anthem of Wales drifted through the clear spring night.

"The Germans couldn't knock the songs from the lips of my people," Mayor Thomas James had said. "We've had a hard knock, but tell the people of Canada that Swansea is still singing and smiling. That's something the Germans won't ever be able to stop."

Then there was no gas, electricity or water in the hotel. Food was cooked on wood stoves and oil burners, candles lighted the rooms and water carried in pails had to be boiled before using. Mobile canteens still were being used to take food to rest centres in the outskirts and one I saw demonstrated the Empire-wide participation in the war effort. 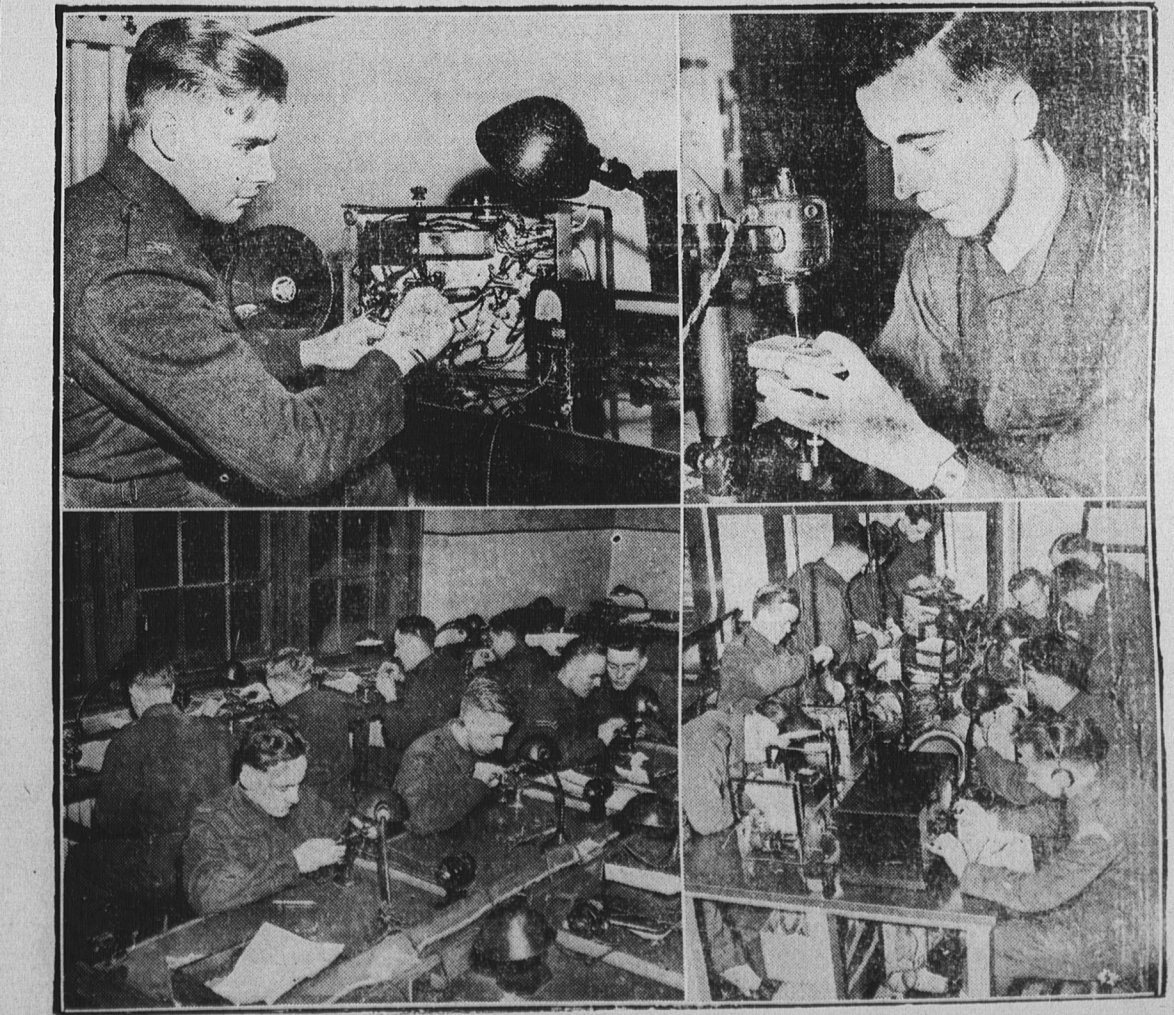
